Rapid progress is being made on the big power plant of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company in Salem. The turbine engine, 3000-horse power, has been mounted, as is also the direct-connected generator of the same capacity.

Part of the new concrete floor for the main building has been laid. All wires connecting machines, and those coming into and going out of the house, are being laid in tubes, and these are concreted into the floor so that they will be there a long time.

FARM ADVISER AIDS GROWERS

Principles of Tillage to Increase Yields Explained by S. P. Farm Adviser.

The same principles of tillage, Campbell saw here in connection with his general observations shows that the real advantage of careful preparation of the soil before setting is sometimes, but not generally fully considered and appreciated.

It is very important to first prepare the surface by leveling, says Campbell. "Then arrange for irrigating in such a manner that water may not only be evenly applied over the whole surface but in as short a time as possible."

More evidence of what cultivation of a growing crop means was shown to Campbell by A. B. Shields of Delano, Kern County, California, in four heads of wheat from a stool grown on Shields' ranch. This stool had ample space and was cultivated while growing, no fertilizers or irrigation being used.
