VERY LITTLE LOSS IN THE PRUNE CROP

Picking Has Been Going on Very Generally Even in the Heavy Rain

A man well versed and interested in the prune industry made the statement yesterday to a reporter of The Statesman that he does not look for any loss to speak of in the prune industry from the rains of yesterday and the day before, and of Monday night.

He says that there is seldom a year in prune picking time when there is not some rain, that a little rain does not injure prunes on the trees; especially if there are plenty of pickers and of drying space. He said that at the present time

there is ample drying space for the balance of the crop on the trees, and that pickers generally have been working right through the showers, and in many cases in the heavy rains.

In that part of the state no one connected with the industry has been worrying. If the weather man is right, and we have fair weather today, it is not likely that the prune pickers will not be bothered much more this season with rainy weather.

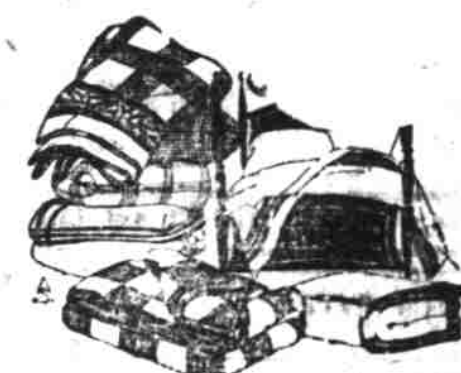
