UNIQUE SERVICE IS ANNOUNCED

Old Preparatory Service to Be Revived by Presbyterian Church

During the early history of the Presbyterian church and until recent years, it was the custom to hold a "preparatory service" late in the week just preceding the observance on Sunday of the Lord's Supper. This custom is being revived and the time-honored "preparatory service" will be held at the First Presbyterian church on Friday evening, October 13, looking to the communion service on next Sunday.

Dr. Carl G. Doney, president of Willamette university, will speak on Friday evening, his subject being some phase of the atonement of Christ. There will be special musical numbers, including a solo by Mrs. Ward Willis Long. The meeting is open to the public.

A very noteworthy feature of this preparatory service is the fact that an outstanding Methodist leader is to deliver the address. It is recalled that in years not far gone by, representatives of different evangelical denominations met to discuss pro and con their petty differences, but here we have a great church meeting to consider with the representative of another denomination the paramount fact upon which all are agreed—the atonement of Christ.

BULB FIRM TO EXPAND

Articles of Incorporation Are Filed by Newly Organized Company

Expansion and experimentation on a big scale will be the net result of the filing of articles of incorporation this week for the Oregon Bulb company of Salem. The officers are: James Forbes of Portland, president; W. C. Franklin, Salem, vice president; Rollin K. Page, Salem, treasurer, and W. C. Dibble, also of Salem, secretary.

The new corporation succeeds the old firm of Franklin & Dibble, who started the bulb business here several years ago. They were practical florists, who believed that conditions here were ideal for the production of quality bulbs. For seven years they have been planting bulbs, testing varieties and experimenting in various methods of culture, until now they feel that the bulb business in Oregon is past the trial stage and is as assured as the growing of apples—which, by the way, was once held to be impossible in Oregon.

Capital is Ample—With ample capital, \$15,000, the new corporation proposes to carry on all the old business, but to branch out on a much larger scale. It will do some line of experimentation that had not heretofore been undertaken. Formerly the promoters wanted to know that the country was right. Now they know it is and they can go as far as they like in fine plant breeding.

Some idea of how the Oregon bulbs have been capturing the trade may be gathered from the statement that the company has this year sold to every one of its last year's wholesale customers from two to 10 times as many bulbs as a year ago. It has sold 100,000 bulbs to wholesalers. Half of these were to California. Reputed to be "the land of flowers"—but it buys its bulbs from Oregon. The retail season is just now beginning. An enormous number of bulbs will be sold of the five standard flowers: Tulips, narcissus, gladiolus, dahlia, and lily. The company has a few crocuses, but has not yet gone deeply into this plant.

Notables Entertained—During the past year the "tulip farm," as it is known, has entertained some notable visitors. Among these was Chauncey Olcott, the famous comedian; Charles P. Keyser, superintendent of parks, Portland; W. H. deGraff, tulip grower, Holland; R. F. Schmitt, also a tulip grower from Holland; Louis Blockman, of the Idaho horticultural board, Lewiston, Idaho; Peter Bissett, head of the bureau of plant industry, Washington; Dr. David Griffiths, director of experimental farms, Washington; Kent Beattie, of the federal plant quarantine board, Washington; Anthony H. Metzlar, Netherlands consul.

The new incorporation is to have its business office with Page & Page in the Ladd & Bush bank building.

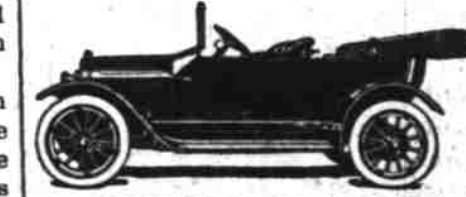
Kozer Demurs to Suit Brought by Portland

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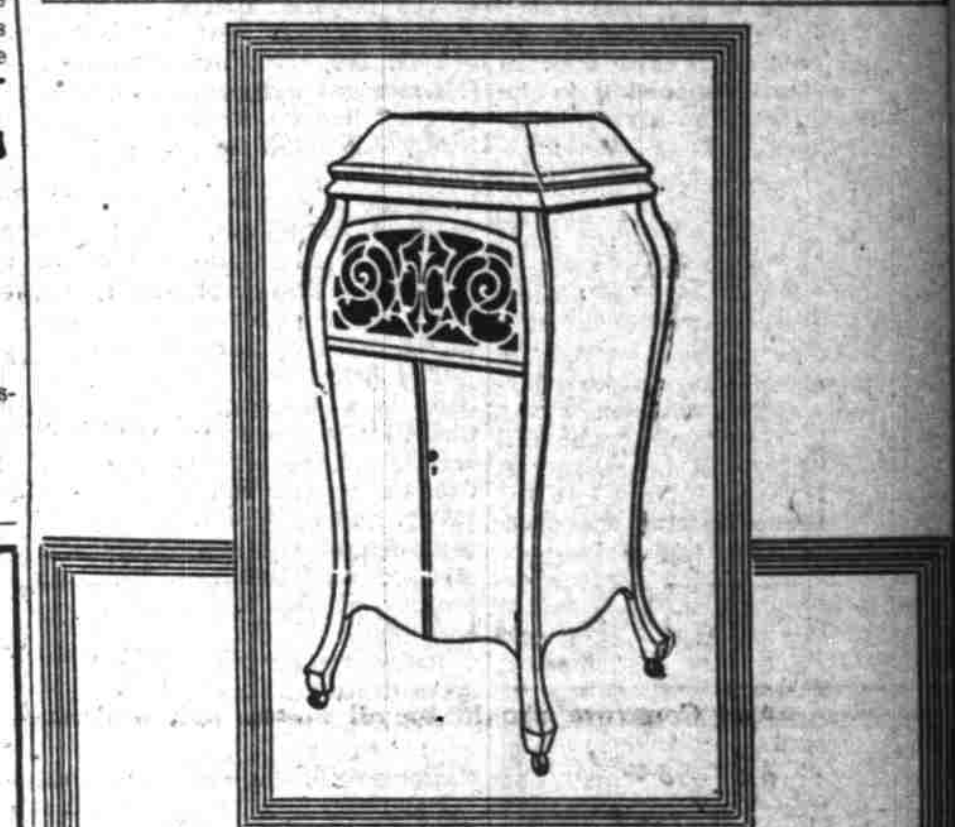
