NORMAL LEVEL IN EXPENSES REACHED

lions will leave about one billion, two hundred fifty million, or the annual expense prior to the World war. So the policy was successful, and exclusive of expenditures arising out of the war, we have reduced the expenditures of the government to the normal of 1914.

Expenses Greatly Reduced
"The way to reduce taxation is to reduce expenditure, and we reduced the expenditure of the government during the last two years of President Wilson's administration by appropriating three millions of dollars less than the estimates demanded, and during the four years that the Republican party has been in control of the house of representatives, we have reduced expenditures four billions, two hundred fifty millions below the estimates. For the year 1921 alone we reduced the taxes eight hundred fifty millions.

"All legitimate activities of the government are adequately provided for. We go to the country upon a successful record, of which this is part, and ask comparison of our efficient method with the inefficient method of the preceding Democratic administration, during which time over fifteen billions of dollars was absolutely wasted, which the people will have to pay with interest thereon at 4 per cent.

Tariff Favorably Received
"The recently enacted tariff

law has been generally received with great favor throughout the United States. In a speech in the Congressional Record of September 27, 1922, I analyzed the bill in some detail. Several things stand out prominently, and among them is the fact that the interests of the west are better provided for than in any preceding tariff act; our products and industries receiving more effective consideration and protection than ever before; that labor is the greatest beneficiary of a protective tariff; that the average rate of duty on dutiable articles under the Dingley act of 1897 was over 25 per cent, under the Payne act of 1909 was over 21 per cent, but under the Fordney act of 1922 is about 16 per cent; that the reductions in rates of duty especially include those on goods, wares and commodities which are consumed by the people generally and compose over 75 per cent of the total value of such consumption; that the increases of duty in the act are to protect new industries, new developments, and new products of established industries, and to place heavier duties on luxuries; and that the industries of the country are protected to the degree, the nature and extent the competition with them requires. If, under changing conditions, the rates in the present act do not sufficiently protect them, under the flexible tariff provision of the act, the president of the United States can alter the rates. However, the exercise of this power by the president is carefully guarded.

Foreign Goods at Peak
"A careful and extensive study of the importations for the past several months shows that the foreign goods imported into the United States from abroad are being sold in this country for the highest prices they will bring, and still effect sales. Since these goods are being sold for all the traffic will bear, it is evident that the rates of duty which are generally higher than the Underwood rates, will not cause an increase of prices to the consumer, but will cause foreign producers and importers to pay out of their extravagant profits a larger amount into the treasury of the United States. If the rates of duty in the tariff of 1922 had been in effect in 1920, the year of peak prices, there would have been put into the treasury of the United States from duties on imports, about \$400,000,000 more than was paid, and that without any increase of price to the consumer.

Oregon Fortunate
"Oregon was exceptionally fortunate at the recent session of congress. Among other matters of importance were the items in the river and harbor authorization act. We have about one-tenth of the amount of authorizations in the act, as finally agreed to, over 90 per cent of which were included in the bill as it originally passed the house. Congressmen McNamara and Stannett are very valuable and able representatives, well liked and trusted by the membership of the house, and wholly devoted to all of the propositions beneficial to the state. We not only work well together, but also with the delegations from the other western states.

"I will participate in the campaign, as I believe the welfare of the country depends upon the continuance of the Republican party in power, and that its defeat would be a great injury to our living prosperity. Business is rapidly regaining normal conditions. The unemployment prevailing a year ago has practically disappeared, and the department of labor states that at the present rate, there will be a labor shortage.

Will Visit Waterways
"I expect to visit every waterway in which improvements are desired, before returning to Washington, in order to obtain full information for use before the committee on appropriations in obtaining the moneys needed to construct them. The largest single item is the construction of the two jetties at the entrance to Coos bay which will cost over \$3,000,000. I expect to obtain between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000 for our river and harbor improvements.

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ever, make representations should the vested rights of sailors and stokers aboard French-owned ships and flying the French flag be deprived of their half or entire litre of wine.

Officials Appalled
French line officials are absolutely appalled at the Washington reports that their ships are liable to seizure as common smugglers. They declare that, outside the financial loss which would be irreparable, there is the question of personal privilege and liberty on which they would be unwilling to yield.

The financial loss to the French line would be hundreds of thousands of francs monthly. On one trip in August, with 1,011 passengers aboard, the steamer Paris sold 1,250 bottles of champagne, 252 bottles of fine burgundy and Bordeaux wines and 87 bottles of liquors.

OVER 50000 IS RAISED FOR Y

Budget Gradually Approaching Goal and Solicitors Are Jubilant

At the Thursday noon luncheon for the Y. M. C. A. budget soliciting committee, subscriptions aggregating \$8,209.50 were reported. This represents 362 contributors, an average of \$22.68. Last year, with the budget estimate amounting to \$10,000, there were 525 subscribers, an average subscription of \$19.04. This year, they're going in a little deeper.

The campaign has developed one fact—that the local Y is impressively entrenched in the local esteem. The average subscription is larger, more are coming in, for the canvass is not nearly ended, and almost no old ones drop out and many new ones enter. The canvassers have not reported a word of criticism of either the personnel of the Y control, or of the budget as a whole and the activities it promotes.

VESSEL BURNS BUT ALL ABOARD SAVED

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dations, it is believed that many of those rescued from the City of Honolulu will have to remain on her decks until larger vessels arrive. The West Farallon's registered tonnage is 7451. She was bound from San Francisco to Yokohama.

Less than half a dozen of the passengers were from the eastern part of the United States. A large number were from Honolulu, others from Los Angeles and other southern California points while the remainder came from other parts of the Pacific coast.

Fifty-six of the passengers were in the salon, the other 16 third-class. Thirty-four of the salon passengers were women. One woman was traveling third class, with a baby girl.

Former German Liner
The City of Honolulu originally was the German passenger liner Friedrich Der Grosse, built at Fretlin in 1896 and used in trans-Pacific travel, until 1914, when she was interned in an American harbor. When the United States entered the war, the liner was renamed the Huron and used as a transport carrying troops to France.

After the war, the Huron was brought to San Pedro, Cal., and was reconditioned for the Los Angeles Steamship company. The City of Honolulu and her companion ship, the City of Los Angeles, formerly the German steamer Kron Prinzessin Cecilie, recently began the first direct passenger service with Honolulu that Los Angeles ever has had.

The City of Honolulu registered tonnage is 10,688; her length 522 feet. The vessel has twin screws.

Messages Brief
Up to 8 o'clock tonight only two brief messages had been received from Athens.

from the West Farallon since the rescue, one that the transport Thomas, instead of the liner Enterprise would pick up the survivors and the other that the City of Honolulu was likely to sink at any minute.

Captain Walks messages thru out the day to the Federal Telegraph company were extremely brief. His reports were merely that he was proceeding to the rescue, later that he had sighted small boats, later yet that the passengers were coming aboard and finally that the rescue was complete. These consisted of hardly a dozen words each.

All Are Safe
Captain Lester of the City of Honolulu sent one message, that he and all those in his charge were safe aboard the freighter, Struthers & Barry, operators of the vessel, said they had heard only one report of a few words from Captain Walk, to the effect that he had abandoned the people who had fled from the burning ship.

The assumption here was that the crew of the West Farallon was so busy taking care of the 217 people they had rescued that there had been no opportunity to dispatch more complete reports of the disaster.

Remains of Evan Evans at Rest in Mausoleum

DALLAS, Ore., Oct. 12. (Special to The Statesman).—The remains of Evan Evans, one of the most prominent farmers and fruit growers in this vicinity who passed away at his home east of here Sunday night, were laid to rest in the Mount Crest Abbey Mausoleum at Salem, Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Evans was born in Wales on May 10, 1863 and came to America when 11 years old. On January 18, 1888 he was married to Martha Cauthorn, who with two daughters, Mrs. George Kurre of Dallas and Miss Carrie Evans, a teacher in the Portland schools, survive him. Mr. Evans was a member of the local Masonic lodge and that organization attended the funeral in a body.

HIGHWAY ADDITION IS NOW REALITY

Engineers Ready to Make up Plats and Lots Will Soon Be on Sale

Highway addition is now practically all over but the money and the subsequent shout. The civil engineers who began work Monday morning have finished their work, and today will make up the plats, ready for the dedication of the streets to the city.

There are 34 lots in the four and one-half acres of the addition. The price will run from \$125 to \$250 per lot. The lots are of varying sizes and shapes. The square unit was used only as something to be departed from, and a really artistic, "different" boulevard has been laid out. The deeds, or rather the options for deeds, are in the bank, ready to be taken up. The property will have to be sold before the deeds can be taken up. As there is no profit, all the lots being sold at actual acreage price, they will have to be sold before the deal can be consummated.

Hanford MacNider Not Candidate for Commander

NEW ORLEANS, Oct. 12.—(By The Associated Press).—Hanford MacNider, national commander of the American Legion tonight declared that under no circumstances would he be a candidate to succeed himself as national commander and that he would "bitterly oppose" any proposal to change the national constitution of the legion which would make possible a second term for a national head of the legion.

"I would regard such an action by the legion as a tragic mistake," Mr. MacNider said in a statement.

Elgin Motor Car Company May Settle Difficulties

CHICAGO, Oct. 12.—The Elgin Motor Car corporation, against which receivership proceedings were instituted today by three Chicago banks, resulting in the appointment of a receiver, has \$3,000,000 capital stock outstanding, according to William Lister, counsel for the company. New capital has been needed and hope of a solution of the company's difficulties has not been abandoned, the attorney said.

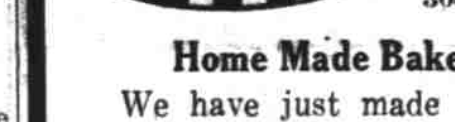
The game warden declined to comment upon the alleged hunting of mountain goat near Kootenai without a license and the giving of false names to a ranger who questioned the hunters.
