More than 40 years ago his father, William A. Kirk, filed on government land in Morrow county. He died in 1903. A year and a half ago his widow, Mrs. M. E. Kirk, now of Payette, Ida., received a letter from an attorney at Washington, D. C., saying that he had discovered in the records that William A. Kirk had overpaid the government, and for a third of the overpayment offered

to recover the money for Mrs. Kirk and her children. He was instructed to go ahead, though the Kirk family did not expect results. However, more than \$100 was recovered to be divided among Mrs. Kirk and the heirs.
