"Unless you have a face shaped like a violin, don't aspire to be a really great singer," is the advice Miss Van Gordon of the Chicago Opera Company is giving to ambitious young girls.

"High, prominent cheek-bones and a wide face are essential in a singer," she explains, "and you can tell at a glance, merely by the contour of the face, whether a certain person can sing. You see one's head is a sounding box, and the quality of the voice depends on the resonance chambers in the head. The bony structure must be carved for resonance as meticulously as a violin is carved. The real singer has a triangular face, broad under the eye, and tapering down to the chin. Only such facial architecture can produce the important 'head tones'—melting tenor and the brilliant soprano."

Miss Van Gordon will appear in the first of the list of a number of delightful musical numbers which will be in Salem during the coming year.
