**Willamette Law School Faculty Holds Session**  
 The faculty of the Willamette College of Law held a meeting at the Marion hotel Friday during the noon hour for the purpose of discussing the work of the school for the present year.

Plans for the year were considered and the advisability of increasing the entrance requirements discussed. At present candidates for admission are required to be graduates of accredited high schools. It is possible that within another year the standard may be raised so as to require one year of college work for admission.

There are now 51 students enrolled in the law school, 13 of these being members of the senior class, 20 in the junior class, 17 freshmen and one special student. The prospects indicate a very successful year in the school. Dean Van Winkle stated to the faculty that at the spring session of the board of trustees of Willamette university a committee was appointed for the purpose of investigating the matter of endowment for the law school. The law school has an enthusiastic and loyal alumni and it is believed that a movement looking to its endowment would meet with success.
