EVANGELISTIC MEETINGS TO OPEN AT COURT ST. CHURCH

Rev. R. L. Putnam reports progress for the work at the Court Street Christian church of this city. The church is planning for a big evangelistic meeting which is to begin the first Sunday in November. John T. Stivers, who is at present serving as Eugene Bible university evangelist, and Dr. H. C. Epley, music director, will lead the campaign.

Evangelist Stivers has been a very successful preacher of the gospel. Previous to entering the evangelistic field he was pastor of the Riverside Christian church in California. He will take up his labors as state evangelist for the Churches of Christ in Oregon at the beginning of the new year.

Dr. H. C. Epley is well known in Salem. He was for many years musical director of the First Christian church. He has always

taken an active interest in the church life of the city. The church counts its self lucky in securing the services of such an able song leader. Dr. Epley is training a chorus each week previous to the meeting and promises the public a good program of sacred music each night of the series.

During the present ministry the congregation has grown to four times its size when Rev. Mr. Putnam took the pastorate. He is now entering upon his fourth year. The church owns one of the most desirable properties in East Salem. The present building is taxed to capacity with a fast growing graded church school. All debts on the property have been cleared and paying paid. It is the hope of the leadership that in the very near future a fine new structure may be erected, one that will meet the needs of that fast growing community.

H-Y SESSION IS BROUGHT TO END

Convention at Silverton Brings Representatives from Whole Country

SILVERTON, Ore., Oct. 16. — (Special to The Statesman).—The Marion County High-Y boys held a very successful conference at Silverton during the week-end. An unusually large crowd was in attendance. Salem was represented with six members, Woodburn, three; Hubbard two; Silverton, eight; Gervais, three; Stayton, four; Turner, three; Chemawa, two; Willamette university seven.

Besides these there were five speakers and two special leaders. Registration showed that nine different churches were represented. Of these the Methodist had the largest representation present followed with a close second by the Presbyterians. The other churches represented were the Christian, Friends, Baptist, Congregational, Lutheran, Unitarians, and Church of God. Only four of the delegates gave no church preference.

Saturday morning Mayor L. C. Eastman, Superintendent of Schools B. T. Youel and Almon Balch, president of the high school student body gave welcoming addresses to the visitors.

Rev. Ward Willis Long of Salem also addressed the boys during the morning on the subject "The High School Boy's Opportunity." This subject was developed along the lines that during the high school period the habits are being formed for life.
