Nine Water Applications Are Filed with Engineer

Nine new applications for authority to appropriate water from Oregon streams for irrigation purposes are on file with State Engineer Percy A. Cupper. They are: By L. L. Rogers of Pendleton, covering the appropriation of water from Greasewood creek for irrigation of 60 acres, at a cost of approximately \$2000. By W. W. Irwin of Aurora, covering the appropriation of water from Bachert creek for irrigation and power development. By N. J. Lambert, of Grandview, covering the appropriation of water from two springs tributary to Deschutes river for development of six horsepower, and for domestic use. By Louis Dufek of Terrebonne, covering the appropriation of water from two springs tributary to Crooked river for development of 20 horsepower and for the irrigation of 45 acres of land. By G. A. Griswold, of Dallas city, covering the appropriation of water from Waymire creek for irrigation of 25 acres in Polk county, at a cost of approximately \$1500. By Edwin Mays of Tygh Valley, covering the appropriation of water from Kerr creek for irrigation of ten acres, and for domestic use in Wasco county. By Nelson Murray of Pendleton, covering the appropriation of water from an unnamed spring for irrigation of 25 acres in Umatilla county, at a cost of approximately \$500. By M. S. Hughes, of Baker, covering the appropriation of water from Stices gulch for irrigation of 70 acres in Baker county, at a cost of approximately \$2500. By L. D. King, of Portland, covering the appropriation of water from China creek for irrigation of 45 acres in Baker county.
