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WALES WORRIED OVER POLITICS

Opposition Parties Launch Censure Motions On Current Issues of the Day

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Nov. 9.—The position of federal politics is described as critical and an election is likely in November or December, although the parliament has several months to run beyond the end of the year, according to political observers.

Early Election Planned.—An early election is believed to be planned by Premier Hughes as a reply to what he terms the "obstructionists."

Another cause of concern to the majority is the party dissension in Victoria and New South Wales, where a decided movement has to re-establish the old Liberal party and depose Premier Hughes and the former labor men who helped to form the Coalitionist party.

Labor Party Has Candidate.—The Federal Labor party also has encountered difficulties. Following the disclosure recently of corruption on the part of some of those in charge of the party in New South Wales, a "breakaway" party has been formed.

POTASH SUPPLY MAY BE AMPLE

Surveys Made in Western Texas Indicate Surplus for Export is Probable

LAWRENCE, Kan., Nov. 10.—Potash beds large enough to supply the entire American demand for fertilizer and perhaps provide a surplus for export are likely to be discovered in western Texas, according to H. W. Hoots, now an instructor in the department of geology in the University of Kansas.

In a territory extending approximately 125 miles north and south and an equal distance east and west along the New Mexican border, strong indications have been found of what is perhaps the largest salt bed in the world.

FLORIDA BY FORD POPULAR PASTIME

All Kinds of Four Wheeled Contraptions Wheeze to Florida Nowadays

JACKSONVILLE, Florida, Nov. 5.—Somebody in Maine or Minnesota discovered a few years ago that he could load his family into the family flivver and drive to Florida for the winter at an expense about equal to the railroad fare for one person.

Now motor cars, from the quiet running sedan to the rattling, banging flivver with frying pans, lanterns, coffee-pots, buckets and other utensils attached all over them from radiators to rear tire racks, descend upon Florida in droves bearing the vanquard of the thousands of tourists who motor to the peninsula in the fall from all parts of the union.

The movement is not expected to be in full swing before the middle of November, but for weeks they have been trickling through the gateways and by October 15 it was estimated that during the daylight hours one tourist car was crossing the border over the three main highways every 15 minutes.

Some of the vehicles include contraptions never before seen on four wheels. One favored by many of the travelers is a chassis with a one-room house, upon it, with everything from stationary wash basin to rocking chairs.

The flivver with camping equipment suspended from every possible part of the car to which a bit of wire or cord can be attached, is the most common long

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distance traveler. A "hay burner" lantern, one of the variety usually seen about farm houses, may be attached to radiator cap. Under the car may be swaying two or three water buckets, each filled with cooking utensils or other articles. A frying pan may be attached to a door handle and the running boards usually are weighted down with baggage and the inevitable small tent that may be erected within a few minutes when the tourist finds a likely place to stop for the night. Every city and town in Florida along the motor routes within the last few years has established a camp site, and in the case of those on the outskirts of the larger place, are equipped with electric lights, water mains and sewerage. Every camp now is under the supervision of the State Board of Health and one sanitary engineer devotes his entire time during the winter to the inspection of them.
