Pacific University Beats Willamette 19 to 6 in Forest Grove Game

Pacific has made it two straight against Willamette by taking the game yesterday 19 to 6. The regular beatings that Willamette handed the Forest Grovers for 13 years prior to 1921, haven't broken the Pacific spirit, for now they've done it right back, two games running.

The dope gave Pacific a little the best of the chances, though not quite as much as the final score showed.

Bearcats Good at Bucking

It's powerful easy to root along the rail and tell 'em what they should have played after it's all over. But if Willamette had stuck a little closer to the straight line bucking game, varied with forward passes, and not trusted quite so much to end and tackle runs, the game might have ended a little differently. The Bearcats were able to gain ground consistently on straight line bucking, even against the handicap of close to 10 pounds shortage in average weight. But they couldn't hold the heavier Pacific chargers for end or off-tackle runs. On a firm, dry field, where the fleet Zeller and the rubbery Isham could speed away from any line lacking, Willamette should have shown in end-running. However, it wasn't a firm, dry field by exactly 1000 per cent, and the Bearcat line couldn't quite stop the big Pacific runners.

Cramer, fullback, could tear up almost every time. He was one of the most consistent ground gainers on either team. Willamette, though greatly outweighted, was able to gain enough on line plays to make it seem almost a standoff for the winner, and its passing was better than Pacific's. But the Badgers stuck to the old-fashioned cave-man stuff of hitting 'em straight, and it was the best game. Willamette soon caught them to do this by breaking up their passes so painfully Pacific soon forgot that there was such a thing as a pass.

Zeller made the one touchdown for Willamette. Pacific made three touchdowns, kicking only one goal.

Big Delegation Attends

More than 200 Willamette players and supporters attended the game, said to be the largest delegation that has ever attended a Pacific-Willamette meet in either town.

Only one Willamette man was injured in the game, Isham, who had his shoulder hurt in the early part of the second half.

Willamette plays Linfield at McMinnville next Friday and then winds up the season by meeting the college of Puget Sound here on Thanksgiving day.

Chicago, Michigan and Iowa Active on Middle West Gridirons Today

CHICAGO, Nov. 17.—Three undefeated contenders for the western conference gridiron championship will risk their chances against dangerous opponents tomorrow in games which probably will narrow the competition for the title.

Chicago must triumph over Illinois on Stagg field; Michigan must take Wisconsin into camp at Ann Arbor, and Iowa must conquer Ohio at Columbus if this trio is to remain on top of the heap tomorrow night. However, in this season of upsets, "big ten" followers will not be surprised if one of the unbeaten three is relegated to the losing column, for the final games of the season a week later. Each of three games is expected to develop into bitterly fought contests with close scores.

More than ordinary interest is attached to the game between Notre Dame and Butler at Indianapolis tomorrow. Neither team has been beaten. The Butler eleven, which is coached by "Pat" Page, a former University of Chicago star, has hung up eight victories straight, including a triumph over Illinois at the start of the season.

PRINCETON AND YALE TO FIGHT

Tiger and Bulldog to Grapple—Other Big Games on Eastern Grids
