Soon she entered the magazine field, and today she is one of the highest paid writers in America. She receives well over \$2000 for a single story. "Humoresque" ran serially in a popular magazine and was later published as a novel. The spirit of the book was transferred to the screen with remarkable fidelity under the direction of Frank Borzage. The work of Alma Rubens, Vera Gordon and Gaston Glass, and Dore Davidson in the chief roles, is said to be particularly pleasing.

Tramp Poet Will Be In Salem Next Monday Night

Vachel Lindsay, America's tramp poet, will appear here under the auspices of the Salem Arts League and Willamette University next Monday evening, November 27, in Waller Hall. Noted for the virility and originality of his verse, Mr. Lindsay has a large following among poetry lovers of the present day. A strange, chanting quality is apparent in it that is characteristic only of him, and which makes his verse doubly enjoyable when read aloud.

He is said to have a most peculiar and delightful manner of reading his own poetry and has become immensely popular among the literary public during the few years in which he has been lecturing. Tickets for the Lindsay lecture may be obtained from the library, the two book stores, and the Novelty Shop on Liberty street. Admission has been placed at 50 cents, with a special price of 25 cents for children. The poet, after the lecture, will autograph copies of his works.

SALEM DENTIST ACCORDED OUSTER

Dr. F. L. Utter Advertises, and Society Considers It Unethical

Dr. Floyd L. Utter of Salem and Dr. E. H. Utter of Newberg, brothers, have been ousted from membership in the Marion-Polk-Yamhill Dental society because they advertised their business in newspapers. It became known here yesterday. The Salem den-

tist had not yet received formal notice of dismissal, but the report was confirmed by Dr. Leon Barwick, president of the organization.

Advertising by dentists, it appears, is considered unethical by the dental profession. Dr. Utter said that he had submitted his resignation to the society prior to its meeting last Friday, but that it was not acted upon at the time, and he also averred that he had done no advertising prior to sending in his resignation. He declares that business has been better since he and his brother began advertising and that they now expect to advertise more extensively. "The move is very satisfactory to us," he declared. 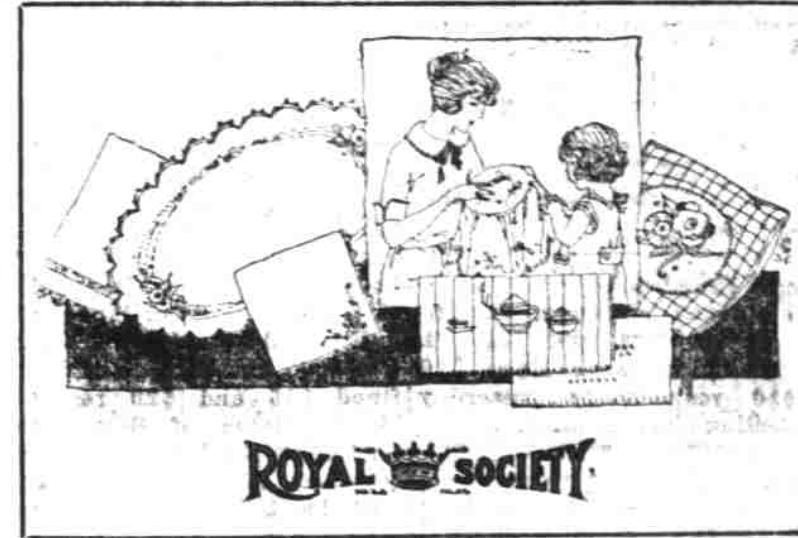
