CLASSY BOXING TO BE SEEN IN CARD AT ARMORY TONIGHT

Joe Hoff has been working out in Salem, and those who have seen him report him in the pink of condition. He is staking everything on speed, which is not bad judgment, for Ad Mackie, his opponent at the armory tonight, is one of the cleverest boxers on the coast at any weight, and whoever meets him must be either clever or dynamically strong or hit-proof, to hope for a chance. These two featherweights go for 10 rounds in the main event.

A number of Portland box fans are to be on hand tonight to see their fellow townsmen perform. Some of them drifted in yesterday. The Portland boxing commission is to be represented on the agreement between the Salem and the Portland commissions, and anything that bars any boxer in one city automatically bars him in the other. This arrangement insures Salem against many a possible job that might be handed out by boxers who might not be on the square. The Company F management has been trying to pick men who will deliver the goods, but in going it alone, might get taken in. With the Portland partnership no real boxer will venture to double-cross the Salem crowds, for to be barred from Portland would be a calamity to the boxers who want to do

business in the best boxing city on the coast.

All the boxers on tonight's card are to appear this afternoon before the physician at the boxing commission for their physical examinations. Nobody goes on without being pronounced sound.

The bouts begin promptly at 8:20 o'clock.

Danny Needham, besides having an Apollo-Hercules build, has a hard head on top of it all, as big Bill Hunt found when they were boxing on Monday. Hunt landed one on top of the Needham dome, which bounced off like a feather falling to goal a brick wall, and Bill has been nursing as if it hurt. He will be in the ring tonight against McDonald of Portland, and the imported heavyweight had better wear a mask or a trick mirror that will steer the Hunt blows away. But at that, Needham can take 'em.

Salem has not had a middleweight event in years and perhaps never one of the class of the Needham-Stanley event tonight. They've had 'em all the way from the Fox Kids, 75-pounders, up to 200-pounder white hopes; but the middleweights haven't yet met up in Salem. They will, tonight, if Stanley is good enough to match Needham, it ought to be good.

LANDIS MEETING WILL TAKE PLACE

No Possibility of Baseball Commissioner Changing Arrangements

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 5.—(By the Associated Press)—There is no possibility of Commissioner Landis reconsidering his plans to hold a joint meeting of the major leagues in New York December 14, as originally scheduled, regardless of whether there is American league participation in the season. The American league club owners are scheduled to hold their annual meeting in Chicago, December 13.

Commissioner Landis made his decision plain tonight when he replied to a statement as to his intentions, but his only reply was that the joint meeting would be held as announced. He explained that he had issued his call for the meeting three weeks ago; that every club owner and official of the two leagues had been informed and that the call had been issued on assurances given during the world series that both the American and National leagues would hold their annual meetings in New York.

After a brief session, the club owners of the American association adjourned tonight without adopting a schedule for the 1923 campaign. The starting date will be dependent upon the date selected by the majors for the opening.

President Hickey of the American association said he would schedule a meeting, probably for Chicago, when the major leagues definitely decide on their opening dates. It is probable that 168 games schedules will be adopted.

U.S.C. TO MEET PENN STATERS

Selection Made Known in Announcement from Conference President

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 5.—The University of Southern California's football team was selected to meet the Pennsylvania State eleven in the New Year's game at Pasadena, Cal., according to an announcement received here tonight from Dr. U. G. Dubach, president of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate conference.

Dr. Dubach said that Southern California received the vote of six schools in the Pacific coast conference; University of Oregon and University of California received one each. The schools voting for Southern California were: Oregon Agricultural college, University of California, University of Southern California, Washington State college and Stanford. University of Oregon cast its vote for itself and University of Idaho voted for

MAY MAKE PEACE WITH STANFORD

Pacific Coast Conference Representatives Will Meet in Seattle

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Dec. 5.—Misunderstandings that have arisen between Stanford university and the Pacific coast conference probably will be adjusted at the meeting of the conference in Seattle Saturday, it was said here today when announcement was made that William D. Fletcher, graduate manager, and Prof. J. P. Mitchell, secretary treasurer of the board of control, would leave Thursday to represent the university at the meeting. Stanford is willing to do its share in straightening out the trouble and it is believed the conference wants the matter settled amicably.

The trouble between Stanford and the conference arose when the organization reprimanded the university for scheduling a football game for December 30 with the University of Pittsburgh, claiming that the game would detract from the Pasadena East-West game New Year's day, which is to be held under conference auspices. Stanford resigned from the conference when the reprimand was received, but as the resignation has not yet been accepted, the Cardinal football team was counted among the conference eleven this year.

BERKELEY, Cal., Dec. 5.—Three University of California representatives, Luther Nichols, the general manager of student affairs, Athletic Manager Raymond Cortelyou and Prof. John U. Perkins, Jr., leave here tomorrow to attend the Pacific coast conference meeting at Seattle.

U. of O. Football Team Wants Huntington Again

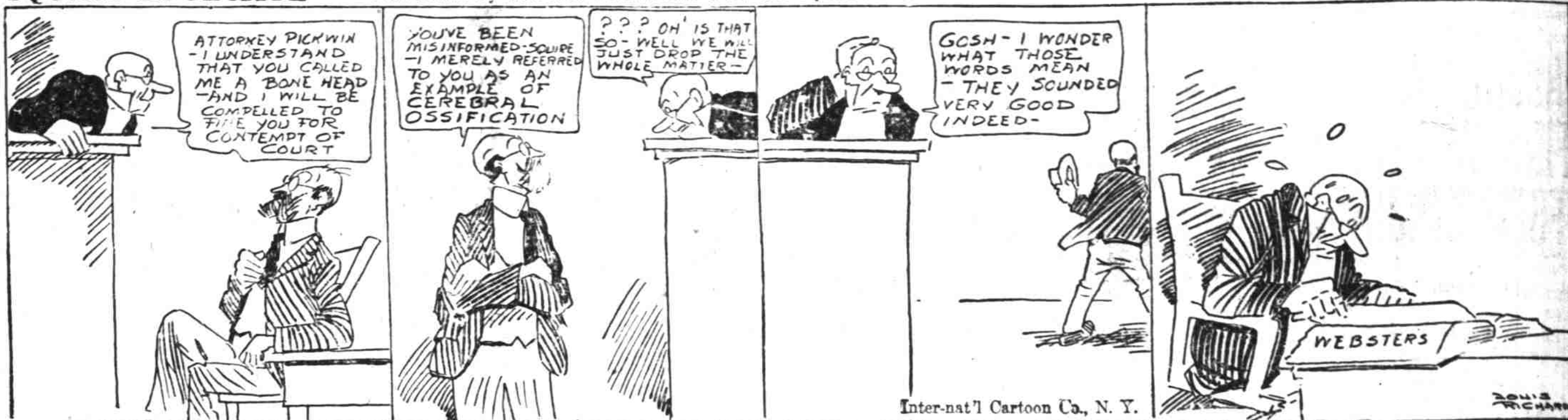

FIRST ROUND IS FINISHED

Bankers, Bakers and Hausers Winners in Basketball Last Night

Last night's winners: Bankers, 11; Bonesteels, 7.

Bakers, 17; Anderson-Browns, 7.

The United States National bank team trimmed the Bonesteels last night in the first game in the Y.M.C.A. commercial basketball league series. The Bonesteels had 12 chances for foul goals and landed five of them, that fattened their one field goal score amazingly; but it wasn't enough to overcome the bankers' lead of five field goals. The Bankers bumped on their foul goals, landing only one out of

11 trials. The score was 11 to 7.

Glenn Gregg was the high point man of the evening, scoring four field goals for the Better-Yet Browns against the Anderson & Browns. Harold Socolofsky made two field goals, and three out of five foul baskets, the best proportion of basket shooting made by any player since the series opened, except once when Ashby of the Hausers made five out of seven. Lieske, tall center for the Anderson-Browns, made their only field score, and Hulse made five free throws out of nine trials. This had been looked upon as one of the most promising games of the whole season, and it was fought with the cheerful optimism of two bulldogs, but the Bakers were a long way ahead in the scoring luck, the final score being 17 to 7.

The nearest to a dead heat of the whole series was the Central Pharmacy vs. Hausers Brothers. Only four personal fouls were called in the whole game. Only five of all kinds were called, and the Central Pharmacy had only one foul called against them, that Ashby missed. Lenon converted one of the two throws given him. One more would have tied the

score, which ended 6 to 5 in favor of the Hausers. This was one of the lowest-score game ever played on the Y floor, and one most replete with fact plays that were blocked by the cleverness of the opponents. Jones, with his two field goals, was the high man of the game.

Last night completed the first round of the series, and everybody has met everybody in one set-to. They start on Friday night on the second round, in the same order as the first night. The series is attracting all the crowds that can get into the building and the rivalry is getting keener than ever.

SMALL LEAGUES ARE QUALIFIED

Thirty Baseball Circuits Embracing 206 Cities Are Included

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 5.—Thirty minor leagues, embracing 206 cities and towns in the United States and Canada, qualified for membership in 1922 in the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues, according to the annual report of J. H. Farrell, the secretary-treasurer, submitted today at the organization's annual session.

One league, the Western International, comprising four clubs, was compelled to disband during the playing season.

Out of a total of 6,460 players employed by these clubs, 3,220 were reported for outright release, 1,558 others were released by assignment of contracts, 457 were released under optional agreements, options were exercised for 297 and 211 were voluntarily retired, according to Mr. Farrell's report.
