THE SALEM DISTRICT HAS ALL THE WORLD RECORD JERSEY COWS BUT ONE AND THE GREATEST COW IN THE WORLD

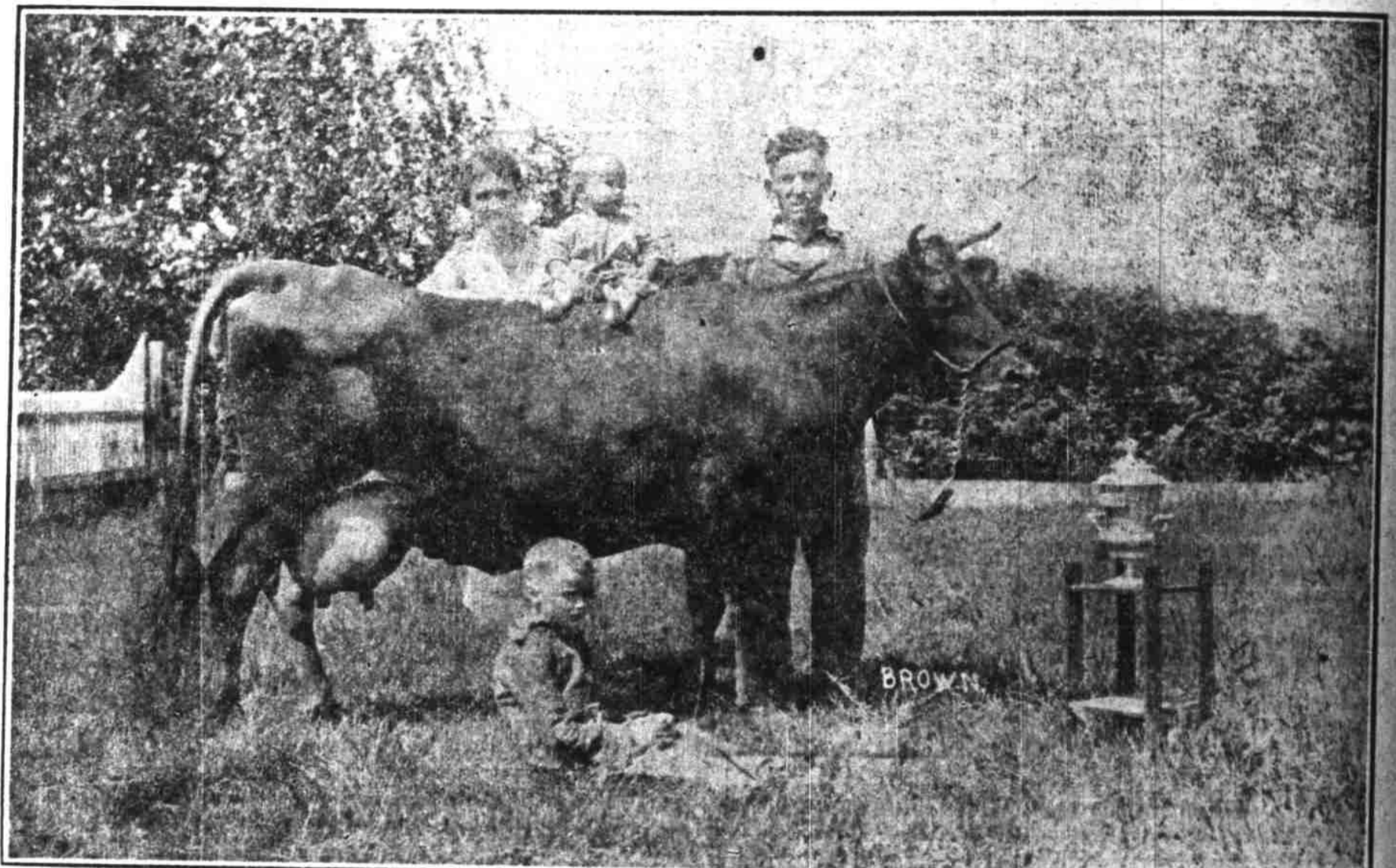
There Are 21 Gold Medal Jersey Bulls in the World, and the Salem District Has Nine of Them; 29 Silver Medal Bulls, and We Have 11 of Them, and Half of All 1000 Pound Butterfat Jersey Cows—This is the Greatest Dairy Country on Earth, and Will Keep on Taking World Records.

The Salem district has the greatest dairy cow on earth, she having produced more butterfat in five consecutive test years than any cow, any breed, living or dead, during a similar test. The total of her first five records is 4414.86 pounds of butterfat. Her first record started at two years of age and her fifth record at six years of age. She is now on her sixth consecutive year's test. She is Vive La France, spoken of elsewhere in this article— Also, up to this year, the highest record 13-year-old Jersey cow (666.24 pounds)— Also the highest record four-year-old Jersey cow (983.63 pounds)— Also the highest record three-year-old Jersey cow (994.6 pounds)— Also the highest record two-year-old Jersey cow (816.1 pounds)— Also the highest record senior yearling (freshened at less than two years of age) Jersey cow (800.08 pounds.)

Silver Medal Bulls, Too There are 29 Silver Medal Jersey bulls in all the world—being bulls producing cows of slightly smaller record production of butterfat. Of the 29 Silver Medal bulls in all the world, the Salem district has 11 of them.

All But One in Classes There are eight classes of world champion Jersey cows, according to their official records of production. Seven of these world record Jersey cows are Salem district cows. Following are the eight, in order according to classes:

- 1. Cows under two years: St. Mawes' Lady, owner, Harvey D. Hill, Independence, Oregon. 829.09 pounds butterfat in year's test.
2. Two and under two and a half years: Pearly Exile of St. Lambert, Owner, Walter Domes of McCoy, Oregon. 816.10 pounds butter at.
3. Two and a half and under three years: St. Mawes' Pretty Lady, L. C. Daniels of Tillamook, Oregon, owner. 824.33 pounds.
4. Three and under three and a half years: Poppy's Dortha, F. E. Lynn, Perrydale, Oregon, owner. 994.25 pounds.
5. Three and a half and under four years: Lass 66th of Hood Farm, C. I. Hood, Lowell, Mass., owner. 919.6 pounds.
6. Four and under four and a half years: Old Man's Darling 2nd, Owners, Pickard Bros., Marion, Oregon. 983.98 pounds butterfat.
7. Four and a half and under five years: Vive La France, Pickard Bros., Marion, Oregon, owners. 1039.64 pounds butterfat.
8. Five years and over: Lad's Iota, Owner, S. J. McKee, Independence, Oregon. 1048.07 pounds butterfat.

greatest dairy cow on earth; she produced more butterfat during her combined records as a two, three, four, five and six year old than any cow of any breed, living or dead, during a corresponding test, as stated in the opening paragraph of this article. Up to a year ago she was the highest record (one year) living Jersey cow in the world, having a record of 1039.2 pounds; which number of pounds she is capable of exceeding—and which she did actually exceed in the test named—but that is another story; a long story; and that is the official figure. Vive La France was bred and developed and is owned by Pickard Bros., of Marion, Marion county, Oregon.

country bordering all the seven seas. This means that the dairying center of the world will be here in this valley. The big money for the milking champions will come here. It means that there is greater encouragement here than anywhere else for the live, up-to-the-minute dairymen who will use his brains and his labors for the building up of his business—let it be dignified by saying his profession. For the breeding of such animals is a profession. It requires the highest type of skill and study and pains. But it is remunerative; and there is zest and pride and satisfaction in the performance of the unusual that is ever before the qualified breeder of the best that the wide world affords. It all means, too, the performance of unselfish work for the good of all—for it is shown by the latest studies of scientific men that the world's milk supply must be increased in order to maintain and conserve and perpetuate a viable race of people. We cannot remain a nation that will do things and contrarily better things without more and more milk. It is as necessary as air and sunshine. The reader, if he has not kept himself posted, may be astonished at the statement. It is somewhat new. But it is true, by the unvarying proof of actual tests, and the sooner it is generally realized.

FARM REMINDERS FROM THE COLLEGE

Force Orchards to Clean Up; Some Timely Hints for Poultry Breeders

(The following are items from a current bulletin of the department of industrial journalism of the Oregon Agricultural College.) "No progressive orchardist should stand for the neglect of orchard trees adjacent to his property which will result in the development of diseases and pests which will spread to his own trees," asserts H. P. Bars, plant pathologist at the Oregon experiment station. "Such pests and diseases make the problem of producing clean fruit and healthy trees more difficult. The state horticultural law provides the method by which such cases can be handled. And all the world learns that it must aid in the increasing of the milk supply, the better for all mankind. And in this process the laws of nature have given the country surrounding Salem, the Willamette valley, the leadership which she is bound to maintain, and bound to profit beyond present computation in maintaining cooperatively in 1921.

peal to your county fruit inspector or to the state board of horticulture who have the enforcement of the law in charge. Keep after them until the offending property is cleaned up."

Placing the roosters in the breeding pens this month is advisable in order that they may become accustomed to their surroundings and acquainted with the balance of the flock before eggs are saved for hatching—O.A.C. experiment station. "Listen for the singing hen," advises F. E. Fox of the Oregon experiment station. "If you haven't any in your flock the chances are that you are getting very few eggs. Change the conditions of feed and care, if necessary, to bring this about."

Draughty houses and damp poultry litter are to be guarded against, particularly at this season of the year.—O.A.C. experiment station. Poultry Co-op Prospers The Pacific Cooperative Poultry producers are now admitting new members, reports E. J. Dixon, manager. Prices that are generally satisfactory to growers are also being returned, the manager says. This is one of the "big six" cooperative bodies that represent 8000 Oregon farmers who sold more than 7 million dollars worth of farm produce cooperatively in 1921.
