

LONDON, Dec. 19. - National savings Certificates sold to November 11 total 601,479,281 pounds sterling. When the certificates were changed from 15 shillings and 6 pence to 16 shillings, there was a temporary lull, but since there has been a sharp increase in demand, and the certificates are now one of the most popular investments in the country. For each sixteen shillings invested the buyer gets one pound sterling at the end of five years.


