BREACH DEVELOPS IN BIG LEAGUES

Scheduling of Sunday Baseball Games is Subject of Warm Debate

NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—(By The Associated Press.)—The breach has developed between the two New York major league baseball clubs over the scheduling of Sunday games next season that may cause considerable trouble at the joint schedulable meeting of the two organizations at Atlantic City, N. J., tomorrow.

Telegrams sent by officers of both clubs to the presidents of their respective leagues, now in Atlantic City, disclose a state of open warfare that had its start in the alleged ejection of the Yankees from the Polo grounds, home of the Giants, which forced the American leaguers to construct their new stadium.

It evidently was after hearing that the Giant owners was maneuvering for the scheduling of conflicting Sunday dates in New York that the Yankee proprietors yesterday wired President Ban Johnson of the American league to oppose any such move that might be made at the Atlantic City meeting.

BANDON BIDDING FOR WOOD PLANT

West Salem Factory Urged to Move, But Prefers to Remain Here

The people of Bandon, knowing a good thing when they see it, have been urging the Oregon Wood Products company of West Salem to come to their town and locate for business. They offer free site, additional capital, almost everything that any enterprising manufacturer could ask.

The company has been making a long line of wood novelties, broom and mop handles, roll paper plugs, adding machine spools, and many other wood articles. It has built up a big business abroad, shipping broom handles direct by carload lots as far as Glasgow, Scotland, and to almost every state in the union. Its market has been seriously limited, however, by the scarcity of material. The company is not now able to run nearly all the time, because its improved plant uses up the raw material much faster than it is being shipped in. It has orders on hand literally for trainloads of manufactured goods, which have had to wait for receipt of stock.

The company uses the clear slabs from the big mills, taking all that the Spaulding company can supply, but this is only one-half of its needs. Some stock is received from Mill City and Silverton, but the supply is still short of the demand.

The little West Salem plant has been one of the busiest places in the whole Willamette valley, when it can get enough material for steady running. It has contemplated a sawmill of its own, to handle logs that would be bought in the open market, as one sure way of supplying enough suitable material for its needs.

The committee chairman, Walter V. Baldwin, declares that the new road program if adopted by the legislature, will mean a reduction in road taxes in the various counties of a millage ranging from as high as seven mills down to five mills depending upon the county. At the same time there will be the amount of money available for actual road maintenance and construction as the state and counties now raise by director and indirect taxation.

The abolishment of the office of county engineer and the substitution of an appointive officer has been indorsed and recommended following a recommendation made some years ago by the County Commissioners' association of the state.

Among the recommendations will be found:

Increased gas tax.

A reduction to a flat fee of the present automobile license fees now graduated.

Reduced district road taxes in the counties.

Reduced road and bridge levies in the counties.

The doing away with the present system of district road supervision under the direct control of county commissioners.

The creation of a third road system to become part of the permanent and secondary highway system. The new branch will be known as county feeder roads and will include all roads not classified as permanent of public highways.

Increase license fees based upon income from individual firms and corporations using the highways for business.

Yerge New Laws

State supervision over all road and highway construction.

The expenditure of all road and bridge funds through the appointive county engineer with the advice of the county commissioners but under the direction of the state highway superintendent.

The placing of all freight trucks, private and public, under similar supervision of the state department of public works, so that all persons using the highways for hauling will be under the same regulatory board.

A general fixed millage tax both for state and counties for road and bridge building.

New road bonding laws.

Cruiser Seattle to be Remodeled Into Flagship

BREMERTON, Wash., Jan. 5.—Orders were received here today at the Puget Sound navy yard to remodel the cruiser Seattle to make her into a flagship for Rear Admiral Hilary A. Jones, commanding the United States fleet. Radio equipment and boat storage will be installed and quarters will be remodeled. The work is to be finished to permit departure from Seattle south by April 1.

ROAD CODE IS FORMULATED

Washington Auto Club To Submit New Rules to Coming Legislature

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 5.—A complete new automobile and road code for the state is among the recommendations to be submitted to the coming session of the legislature by the Auto club of Washington following a two-day meeting of the legislative committee here which adjourned today.

The road code will provide for state aid to the counties, similar to the aid given by the federal government to the states. The report will be submitted to the directors of the auto club at Seattle Monday.

GAME BOARD HAS REPORT

All Winter Trout Fishing Must Be Eliminated, Commission Avers

Crows live to be from 80 to 100 years of age, and they are hungry and eating song and game birds and their eggs all these years, according to the biennial report of the state game commission, distributed Friday. The crow needs an official reprimand, at least; a reprimand couched in bullets or axe, it is inferred.

All-winter trout fishing must eventually be eliminated, the report suggests. The cutting down in the number of trout one person may take is suggested, especially for Klamath and Diamond lakes, where the fish are so big, up to 20 pounds, that much trout flesh is now wasted by anglers who catch more than they can eat.

May Work With Schools

A close cooperation of the game department with the public schools, to teach practical game and wild life conservation, is urged as an insurance for the game for the coming generations.

The annual planting of trout fry has trebled in the past biennium. During 1922 24,064,464 trout fry were put back into the
