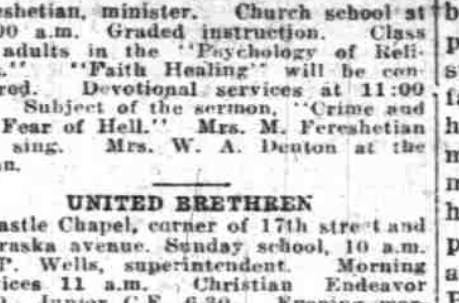

way around and repeat, following by another quarter-turn if desirable. However if this will not help it and your magneto current is still weak it becomes necessary to remove the engine and check over the magneto coils for shorts. Cleaning Spark Plugs. I have often had motorists drive up to my shop with a missing cylinder with the cry that "the darn thing won't run right. Cleaned the plugs in everything, still she won't work, what's wrong with it?" Of course there are a thousand and one things that could

be wrong with it but the most probable cause is still a dirty spark plug irrespective of the fact that he had just cleaned his plugs. I take the offending med up, then I ask him to show me how he cleaned it. Well, he cleaned it around those two points—in fact he took a file and filed the points off the plug. Poor misguided motorist! He isn't to blame, nobody ever showed him and he's not interested enough in the mechanical end of the car to study the underside of the hood, so why should he worry about a little thing like a spark plug. In fact he doesn't know he has any until they begin to give him a little trouble then he hies himself to a repair shop and if the mechanic happens to be honest (which, thank goodness the motorist is beginning to learn that there are a few such animals) he will remove the offending plug, clean it and send Mr. Motorist merrily on his way. Now to clean that plug, if it is a demountable plug, take it apart with a couple of wrenches and clean the carbon, dirt and oil off the porcelain then reassemble. If, of the one-piece type, take a slender bladed knife or corresponding piece of steel and scrape all foreign material from porcelain. Space points about .025 inch apart.
