MANY RECORDS ARE APPROVED

Amateur Athletic Union Endorses Track and Swimming Triumphs Made

NEW YORK, Jan. 6.—The Amateur Athletic Union, through Louis Goldsmith, chairman of the rules committee, today approved 51 record-breaking performances, 47 in swimming and four in track and field events, made last year. Thirty-three of these marks will go down as American records, while 18 will be registered as noteworthy performances, a category including feats under conditions of over distances not recognized as standard.

Welsmuller Makes Many All of these performances are in addition to about 100 others in track and field and swimming events, to which official recognition was given by the A. A. U. at its annual meeting last November.

The predominance of swimming marks is due chiefly to the individual exploits of Johnny Welsmuller of the Illinois A. C., one of the most sensational aquatic performers of all time. The Chicago star is credited in the new lists with 25 American records, 21 at free style and four at back stroke swimming, over distances ranging from 50 to 500 yards, bringing the total number of new marks he has established within the past year to 45. These do not include a long array of noteworthy performances, eight more of which are added to his string in the new compilation.

Welsmuller also helped to establish an American record for the 400-yard relay over a two-year course, the Illinois A. C. team of which he was a member setting a mark of 3 minutes 42 2-5 seconds at Chicago last March.

Three American records and 6 noteworthy performances are credited to Miss Sybil Bauer, premier backstroke star of the Illinois A. C., at distances ranging from 50 to 400 yards.

Two of the new American track and field records displace standards recognized last November.

Through a confusion in data submitted to the rules committee, Penn State college quartet was erroneously credited with a record of 7 minutes 54 4-5 seconds for the two mile indoor relay at a meet here February 1, 1922. Investigation revealed that this time was three seconds faster than actually made and the record is now given to university of Pennsylvania team, which hung a mark of 7 minutes 55 1-5 seconds at an indoor meet here on March 11, 1922.

Other Records Approved The other record changing hands is the indoor running high jump standard. Leroy Brown of Dartmouth leaped 6 feet 4 7-8 inches at a meet here March 11, 1922, to replace the mark of 6 feet 4 3-4 inches made by John L. Murphy of Notre Dame, February 1, 1922.

The two other records approved are:

Four mile relay, outdoors, four men, each running one mile, 17 minutes 4-5 seconds, made by University of Illinois team (Howard Yates, Bruce Patterson, Gordon McGinnis and Russell Wharton) at Drake University relay carnival, Des Moines, Ia., April 29, 1922.

Javelin throw with javelin held in middle, 202 feet 9 1-2 inches, made by Milton Angier, University of Illinois at Drake relay carnival, Des Moines, Ia., April 29, 1922.

LINFIELD WINS FROM BEARCATS

McMinnville Collegians Unexpectedly Take Game from Willamette

Linfield college did a desperate thing to the Willamette Bearcats Friday night at McMinnville by running off with the long end of the score in a basketball game between the two quints. Willamette had them fairly even in the first half, but in the last the Baptists put on a little extra steam and pulled up a score of 23 to 15 by the time the whistle called it all out.

Linfield, while not playing football for a number of seasons until the fall just past, has always had a good basketball record, and the best of them have to play steadily to save themselves against Linfield. At that, the Bearcats expected the score to run about even. The Linfield team has lately players who have been to either for one or more years, while Willamette has only one who has ever before played

his present position in the varsity lineup. The team is not yet settled. A number of changes were made in the Linfield game, and the last call on a "regular" team is still well in the future.

On January 13, a week from last night, the Bearcats are to meet the OAC team at Corvallis. Last year the Corvallis team won two straight by impressive scores, though two years ago the Bearcats were the big victors. Not much is known of the OAC team so far this year. With three of its players on the alumni team that was badly beaten by the Salem high school two weeks ago it is wondered whether the team is going as well this year as it did last. But with the Bearcat team still a mystery, and on its early record not well up to the standard of other years, the result of the game cannot now be well foretold other than by a foundationless guess.

The Bearcats take on Whitman in Salem on January 18, when the Missionaries come south on their barnstorming trip. It has been reported that Whitman is not quite up to its best of last year, though all these bear stories grow every year, until the teams have actually settled down to the conference schedule and become known quantities.

Oregon lost during the week to the fast Columbia club at Astoria. Even the big fire hasn't driven the Astorians into the background in athletics. Oregon was a good deal of a disappointment last year, but expected all last year's team back for this season, so that they will have the better of almost all the other teams of the valley in experience. To lore, to the Astorians is not necessarily a fall-down, for the Astorians have one of the most formidable teams on the coast, in or out of college.

Contract for Potash Supply is Concluded

BERLIN, Jan. 6.—(By The Associated Press.)—The directorate of the potash syndicate has been authorized by the syndicate's supervisory council to conclude a contract with the Potash Importing corporation of America with headquarters in New York City, providing for the supply of all the foreign potash required in the United States during the next five years.

The council also confirmed the report that Germany produced 1,300,000 tons of pure potash last year. Since December 1 last the domestic demand has fallen off, due in a large part to the considerable increase in freight rates.

Tilden Defeats Hunter in Exhibition Match

CHICAGO, Jan. 6.—William T. Tilden, national tennis champion, defeated Francis Hunter, national indoor title holder, in an exhibition match on an indoor court here today, 8-6, 8-6, 8-6.
