

FINGER BOWLS HELD MENACE

State Board of Health Declares They Also Are Tip Inducers

By a regulation adopted by the state board of health at its annual meeting in Salem yesterday the finger bowl in public places is abolished as filthy and dangerous and is denounced as a tip inducer. It will be allowed if it is sterilized after using or a paper cup may be substituted for it.

The board endorsed the new sterilization bill and the eugenics marriage bill, requiring an examination as to mental and physical fitness of both applicants for marriage licenses. These are to be introduced at this session of the legislature. The board also endorsed a food and drug bill requiring a more careful examination of foods and drugs to prevent the sale of articles that might be inferior or dangerous.

Dr. J. H. Rosenberg of Prineville was elected president of the board to succeed Dr. C. J. Smith of Portland. Dr. George E. Houck of Roseburg was elected vice president and Dr. Frederick D. Stricker of Portland was re-elected secretary.

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fic can be resumed between Salem and the north and south. This opens the way to Corvallis and Albany and all points south. The road is of course open to Portland over the west side route.

South of Eugene there has been no interruption except one very brief overflow at Springfield. On through Roseburg and clear to the California line the highway is practically as open as in midsummer.

Detours Possible
The highway west of Jefferson will require a few days for repair. About 120 feet of grade and 150 feet of pavement surfacing and part of the one trestle have gone out. It will be possible to detour around some of this trouble and open the highway, though it is not advised that any traffic count on the road being open until it is officially announced, which may be the last of this week.

There is one slide near Beaver on the Sheridan-Tillamook road, where cars cannot cross. The stages are running, however, and transferring their passengers over the slide. The slide itself should be cleared within two or three days.

Busy work on the upper Columbia river highway has cleared away the slide that was reported and the road is now open all the way to the Dalles. The first cars worried past the obstruction Tuesday afternoon, but today the road will be in perfect condition.

All in all the state road loss is almost negligible, considering the mileage of the roads involved, the magnitude of the flood and the suddenness of the rise that made it impossible to forecast the danger and prepare for immediate protection anywhere.

FRUIT LABELS ARE DISCUSSED

Marion County-Polk Realtors Banquet at Marion Full of Interest

"Oregon First and Always" was the general argument at the annual election and open house of the Marion-Polk County Realtors, held at the Marion hotel, Monday night.

Fruit Labels Discussed
The subject of labeling Oregon fruits and products, so that the state should receive the advertising that it earns by growing and packing its splendid fruits and other products, was discussed at some length. W. Newhouse, assistant general manager of the Oregon Growers' association, was one of the speakers on the important subject. He favored some such label laws, that would identify Oregon products, but along with this form of legislation he favored the strictest inspection to make the quality worthy of such advertising, an then a general wide-spread program of advertising to get the name "Oregon" firmly fixed in the public mind.

The example of California, in capitalizing her collective enthusiasm and loyalty, he cited as the way to accomplish something worth while in making a state name a worth-while trade-mark.

Progress Told Of
H. R. Crawford told of the wonderful progress made in the fruit packing business in Salem, since 1911, when the total output was only about 30,000 cases of canned fruit. This year the King's Food Products company alone packed almost 100,000 cases, besides all its dehydrated products, and all the tremendous output of all the other Salem canneries.

L. H. Roberts told of having bought 27 cans of differently labeled Oregon loganberries, on a trip to the Mississippi valley states with the labels claiming the fruit for cities that never saw a fresh loganberry. He found other identifiable Oregon fruits similarly branded, and none of them bearing the label, "Grown in Oregon." He strongly favored some conservative law that, while allowing any fair credit to the jobbing or wholesaling company, would still insist on the designation "Grown in Oregon."

Officers Elected
The legislative committee of the Realtors, Messrs. Eugene Grabenhorst, L. H. Roberts and Karl Becke, are to take up with the legislature this matter of properly labeling Oregon products.

Officers were elected for the coming year, as follows:
President, George Grabenhorst; first vice president, J. A. Mills; second, Mrs. Winnie Pettyjohn; third, S. R. Tandy, of Jefferson; fourth George W. Hubbs, of Silverton; executive committee, A. C. Bohrnstedt, L. H. Roberts, Karl G. Becke.

In his brief inauguration address, President Grabenhorst set forth the aims of the Realtors' organization: To establish a better fellowship and a closer confidence among the errands, to form a civic unit that will help to lower taxes and make land owning more profitable and attractive, to further the efforts to unify contracts and practices in handling real estate sales, and to boost everlastingly for the betterment of Salem and all of Oregon.

Program Interesting
The association meets regularly on Thursday noons, but because of the Monday meeting already this week, there will be no Thursday luncheon this week.

An interesting literary and musical program was presented. Miss Bruce Putnam presented one of her own piano compositions, a "Song Without Words," that was heartily endorsed. Mr. Floyd McIntyre sang three songs, with Miss Putnam as accompanist—"The Barefoot Trail," "All the World Loves a Lover," and "My Little Gypsy Sweetheart," that were well received. Willard Carey of Willamette university presented several short readings, and A. McCroskey gave two "sow solos" that attracted the absorbed attention of the audience.

One interesting feature of the evening was the fine tribute paid by J. A. Mills and echoed by the other speakers, to the indefatigable efforts of Mrs. Gertrude J. M. Page to make the association a success every week. As chairman of the social committee, her work has gone so far beyond the usual mark of efficiency for similar committee chairman, as to call for a very special recognition. A feature picture unique in its power to make creepy sensations of horror and fascination run up and down one's spine is now at the Liberty. "A Blind Bargain," founded upon a story by Barry Pain called "The Octave of Claudius," a pseudo-scientific story of a half-mad surgeon who believed he could prove the truth of evolution by transforming man back into his early simian characteristics. He induces a struggling young author, whose mother faces death for want of the proper medical attention, to agree to submit himself to be experimented upon by the doctor in return for the money and care that shall restore his mother to health.

Unable to buy his release from his bargain, after failing in love and becoming engaged to the daughter of the publisher who accepted his book, the writer is seized by the surgeon and bound to the operating table. As the surgeon enters his private dungeon to get the monkey, he is crushed to death by one of the human wrecks, results of previous experiments, imprisoned there and the writer's release by the surgeon's wife and the hunchback who was also one of the doctor's victims.

There is a magnificent spectacle in the ballroom scene of the melodrama in which beautiful girls dance amid clouds of soap bubbles. The roles of the doctor and of the hunchback are acted by Lon Chaney, the "actor with a thousand faces." Both characterizations are said to be marvelously finished and differentiated from each other. In the cast are Jacqueline Logan, former "Follies" beauty; Raymond McKee, Virginia True Boardman, Fontaine LaRue, Aggie Herring and Virginia Madison.

That there is good in the worst of us is strikingly illustrated by Robert Cain in Gloria Swanson's "The Impossible Mrs. Bellew," now at the Oregon. Mr. Cain plays the role of a husband who, because he loves another woman, tricks his wife into a divorce, robs her of her precious son and then allows the world to think the worst of her. But eventually, he relents, and in a magnificent and dramatic manner does his best to make amends and bring to the woman who was his wife, the happiness he had so callously robbed her of.
