WILLARD MAY BEGIN OVER

Ex-Heavyweight Champ is Willing to Fight Way to Bout With Dempsey

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(By The Associated Press)—Jess Willard declared today he was willing to fight his way to a return match with Jack Dempsey for the world's heavyweight boxing title if it is necessary to do that in order to convince the public he can get into condition for a battle with the champion.

Must Satisfy Public
This declaration was made after Willard and his manager, Ray Archer, had conferred with Promoter Tex Rickard regarding possible match with Dempsey. There was no definite announcement but it was understood Rickard assured Willard that he was ready to stake a return bout with Dempsey, possibly in July if the former title holder can demonstrate his fitness to the satisfaction of the public.

Negotiations, it was said, would remain practically at a standstill until Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, arrives in the near future from the Pacific coast.

Dempsey at this time is contemplating a reappearance in the movies and negotiating with London promoters who have offered a purse of \$250,000 for him to box Joe Beckett, English heavyweight, during Derby week in May.

Insists Only 36
Willard in the meantime plans to remain indefinitely in New York and keep himself in condition with daily gymnasium work-out. He expressed little concern over the edict of William Muldoon, chairman of the New York State Athletic commission, barring the former champion from fighting in this state, which he is over or under the age limit of 35, and branding his attempted comeback as "ridiculous." He insisted that he is only 36, despite records to the contrary and declared a fight with Dempsey could be staged easily outside of this state if the commission maintains its barrier.

Bill Fourteen
It provides that all aliens, not eligible to citizenship in the United States; would be specifically barred from ownership of real property or control of corporations in Oregon under the terms of a bill introduced in the house of representatives yesterday afternoon by Representatives Bailey and Huston.

The bill is modeled closely after the California anti-alien land law and is similar to the Barge Leonard bill introduced in the 1921 session of the Oregon legislature and defeated because of the federal opposition to the measure at that time.

The measure has the backing of the American legion.

A clause, by which the respective treaties of the United States with the countries whose nationals might be involved, is included in the measure and an effort has been made to guard against possible misinterpretations of the motives back of the bill.

NEW ROW APPEARS IN BALL RULINGS

Bill McCarthy, Coast League Head, Asserts Right to Independence

CHICAGO, Jan. 10.—An assertion that the Coast league may act independently, an appeal for action by President A. R. Tierney of the Three I league, and a statement by Baseball Commissioner K. M. Landis affirming the right of the majors to act, were developments today in the row brewing in organized baseball because the majors forced a modified draft on the anti-draft leagues and raised the optional player limit from eight to 15.

William H. McCarthy, of the Pacific coast league, has said his organization will assert its right to act independently if the majors violate the major-minor agreement in regard to drafting players.

In a message to practically every minor league head, President Tierney urged them to call on Mike Sexton, president of the minor associations, to take steps in defense of the minors.

WOULD RESTRAIN HIGHWAY PROGRAM

Resolution is Introduced by Representative Lewis May Call Halt to Contracts

The program of the present state highway commission would be arbitrarily halted and the proposed letting of contracts for about 80 miles of road work restrained, under the terms of a resolution introduced in the house yesterday by Representative Lewis of Multnomah.

Lewis said that he had not consulted with Governor Pierce about the resolution although it sets forth that it is because of the statements in the governor's message relative to alleged failure of the highways, that its author believes the road work should be stopped until the policy of the present administration is learned.

At the meeting of the commissioners to be held here January 19, \$500,000 worth of road bonds are to be sold and contracts totaling this act shall be appointed by the governor by and with the advice and consent of the senate and when vacancies occur during the recess of the senate the governor shall make temporary appointment until the next meeting of the senate when he shall nominate some person to fill such office; and any person so nominated, who is affirmed by the senate, shall hold his office
