JOHNSON WINS
OVER BRENNANSensational Iowa Heavy-
weight Now in Line to
Fight Jack Dempsey

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Floyd Johnson, sensational Iowa heavy-weight, decisively defeated Bill Brennan, Chicago veteran, tonight in a 15-round contest at Madison Square Garden. Johnson received the judges' decision after out-fighting and outboxing his rival all the way.

In Champ Class

It was the old test for Johnson, who has come rapidly to the fore in the past few months and his victory over the battle-scarred Chicagoan put him in the front rank of contenders for the title held by Jack Dempsey. Ring critics were agreed that the form shown by the young Iowa was the most impressive of any pugilist who has appeared on the heavyweight horizon in some time.

Johnson, realizing that his championship aspirations were at stake, set a furious pace from the start. He directed a smashing attack to the head and body and had Brennan in distress in several rounds, notably the 13th and 15th. His opponent cost him several chances to put away what might have been a decisive blow.

Brennan weathered the storm of his young opponent's attack largely because of his fine generalship and apparent good condition. He was totally unable, however, to carry on any kind of an offensive.

Many Notables Present

A galaxy of notables in present and past heavyweight history witnessed the bout, including three former champions, Jess Willard, Jack Johnson and James J. Corbett. Willard, who is seeking a return match with Dempsey, was given a tumultuous greeting.

Jack Remault, Canadian heavy-weight, knocked out Joe McCann of Newark, N. J., in the fourth round of the 12-round semi-final match. Remault weighed 192½ and McCann 155½ pounds.

Fights by Rounds:

Round 1.—Brennan rushed Johnson at the start, but the Iowa countered with his left, landing several stiff jabs to the jaw. Both mixed willingly with Johnson landing the cleaner blows.

Round 2.—Johnson took the offensive and both landed hard body blows at close quarters. Johnson shot over a hard right to the ribs and Brennan countered with a left hook to the chin. They were mixing furiously as the bell rang.

Round 3.—Brennan punished Johnson about the body during a session at in-fighting, but was shaken by two successive left hooks to the jaw. Both missed wild swings and Brennan connected with a right swing to the head. A right uppercut momentarily staggered Johnson.

Round 4.—Johnson shot over two potting rights to Brennan's body without drawing a reply. Brennan jabbed with his left to the jaw, but was forced to clinch by a smashing right to the head. Johnson forced the Chicagoan about the ring with battering of rights and lefts to the head.

Round 5.—Brennan accidentally slipped to the floor as they were mixing, but quickly regained his footing. Brennan absorbed a hard right to the jaw, but drove in his left in retaliation. Brennan blocked Johnson's frequent lunges and forced the Iowa to swing wildly.

Round 6.—Johnson rocked Brennan with a right smash to the jaw. A stiff right jab to the head opened a cut over Brennan's left eye. Both drove in hard blows to the body and Johnson missed a wild swing with his left.

Round 7.—Johnson sent Brennan back on his heels with a crashing right swing. The Iowa set a terrific pace, but Brennan seemed content to stay on the defensive. Blood flowed from cuts over both of Brennan's eyes after a swift exchange. Johnson hurt Brennan with hard rights to the body.

Round 8.—Dancing around his opponent, Johnson shot in right and left to the head and sent Brennan back with several rights to the ribs. Brennan connected with a right hook to the jaw. Brennan absorbed severe body punishment as they exchanged punches at close quarters.

Round 9.—Brennan appeared weakened by Johnson's steady attack to his body and clinched repeatedly. He caught Johnson twice on the jaw with letting lefts but the Iowa came right back with both fists.

Round 10.—Johnson staggered Brennan with a two-fisted attack to the head and body. Brennan shot in a right to the jaw and followed with his left, but the jolts lacked steam. Both swung furiously with both fists for a few moments, Johnson landing effect-

ively, with his left to the head and body as the bell rang.

Round 11.—Johnson drove Brennan back with a terrific right hook and bombarded the Chicagoan about the head. Brennan landed lightly to the jaw while Johnson swung wildly. Johnson was forcing the fighting as the round ended.

Round 12.—Continuing his furious pace, Johnson showered Brennan with rights and lefts to the head and kept the veteran on the defensive. Johnson had Bill hanging on as he drove in stiff punches to the jaw and ribs. Brennan was apparently in distress as the round ended.

Round 13.—Johnson shook Bill with a hard right to the body and drew a fight swing to the head in reply. Johnson swung wildly several times before connecting with a right to the body.

Round 14.—Brennan took the offensive for a few moments and jabbed Johnson about the head with his left. Johnson swung wildly and took another right to the head. Both appeared tired as the result of the swift pace.

Round 15.—Johnson drove in his left to the head and body, staggering Brennan with a smash to the ribs. Both landed hard blows to the head. Johnson unleashed a terrific attack to the head, forcing Brennan to clinch. He sent the Chicagoan to the ropes and battered him with terrific punches to the head.

argument of reduction and thereafter other examinations were held, one of which was under the supervision of the superintendent, completed February 13, 1922, and showed the bank insolvent to the extent of about \$700,000. In place of anticipated losses of \$184,902.64, the same should have been placed at about \$300,000, which would have left the bank insolvent to the extent of approximately \$35,000, and this estimate does not take into consideration other loans classified as "doubtful or probable" by the appraising committee, the loss on which they anticipated would run into very large figures. The state superintendent of banks knew or was negligent in not knowing of the very insolvent condition existing at the time of the consolidation of the banks, and for a considerable time prior thereto.

Impairment Shown

The superintendent of banks knew or was negligent in not knowing that the Peoples Bank was insolvent, and that a statement of its condition as of October 1, 1921, showed an impairment of capital stock to the extent of \$19,225.23 before providing for anticipated losses, but without taking into consideration the increase in the capital stock of \$100,000 and the premium of \$25,000, which was approximately 80 per cent subscribed, and that there would have been no double liability upon peoples' stock but an actual return to the stockholders, as the bank had been liquidated after the subscription was completed for the additional capital stock.

Consolidation Allowed
That the superintendent of banks therefore authorized the consolidation of a solvent institution with an insolvent institution and brought into double liability those holding stock in the solvent institution, and therefore causing them great and irreparable damage.

The superintendent of banks took part in the meetings of the directors of the State Bank of Portland and knew or was negligent in not knowing that such bank was insolvent; but the superintendent took no part in the meetings of the board of directors of the Peoples Bank and knew or was negligent in not knowing that the bank suffered but an impairment of capital stock, and in spite of this knowledge, or the negligence in not ascertaining the facts, the superintendent of banks demanded that upon consolidation four shares of stock in the solvent Peoples Bank be used in the purchase of three shares of stock in the insolvent State Bank of Portland, and finally allowed consolidation at the ratio of five shares of Peoples for four shares of State Bank stock.

Conrad Olson Mentioned
Another accusation is that of permitting Conrad P. Olson to use the superintendent's name and position in oral and written form as approving a consolidation of banks when this use was in furtherance of fraud.

Bramwell is accused of allowing the increase of capital stock in the Peoples Bank to be used by Olson in the purchase of the stock of Walker and Eckern of the State Bank of Portland, at a proposed profit to Olson from his own share-holders of \$17.50 a share.

Bramwell is accused of violating the law "in that contrary to the subscribed oath of the said superintendent, he has not faithfully and impartially discharged the duties of his office as above disclosed."

Klamath Case Cited
The petition continues: "We respectfully call to the honorable board's attention the circumstances of the failure of a bank at Klamath Falls, which after it had failed depositors relied to its service, opened the bank and it again failed, although a representative of the superintendent was supposed to be there and guard against any such result. We believe this circumstance justifies your careful investigation as containing possibilities of disclosing negligence as grave as those which have occurred in the manipulation of the affairs of the Portland banks."

The requests of the petitioners to the banking board are:

Demands Listed
That the board compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of books and papers which shall fully disclose the condition of the banks mentioned and the knowledge the superintendent must have had of them.

That the board find from its examination that Bramwell is not qualified to hold the office of superintendent of banks.

That "in the sound discretion of this honorable board that it remove from office for cause Frank C. Bramwell."

That the board appoint in his place a man qualified in ability under the statutes.

PREJUDICE CLAIM
MAY BE CURBEDLocal Circuit Judges May Be
Made More Secure in
Their Positions

Constitutionality of the law whereby affidavits of prejudice against a circuit judge filed by attorneys with the chief justice of the supreme court are sufficient to cause the assignment of another judge to hear particular cases, is the issue in the case of Shaughnessy against Kimball, which was argued in the supreme court yesterday.

Under the law if such an affidavit is filed with the chief justice, he is required to assign another judge to the case without investigation.

Representative T. B. Kay of Marion county has introduced in the legislature a bill which would modify the present law and make it necessary for the affidavit of prejudice to state reasons, and would require the chief justice to pass upon the reasons, and then grant or reject the petition in his discretion.

MISKE WINS KNOCKOUT

OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 12.—Billy Miske of St. Paul, Minn., won on a technical knockout over Harry Foley of Hot Springs, Ark., in the first round of a scheduled ten round boxing contest held here tonight.
