School children, parents and educators are interested in "The Days of Buffalo Bill," the romantic chapter drama of American history made by Universal which comes to the Bligh theater every Friday and Saturday.

This 18 episode play tells the story of that epochal period when the east and west were united by hands of steel by the building of the Union Pacific railroad. In recognition of Universal's contribution to education in the filming of this serial, the Union Pacific placed at the disposal of Carl

Laemmle, president of Universal, historical equipment, and western trackage.

Engines, coaches and flat-cars of the period, shipped from the Union Pacific museum in Omaha, Nebraska, were used.

Sergeant Murphy, veteran of the Soldiers' Home at Sawtelle, near Universal City, was a fireman on "Jupiter," one of the engines which participated in the joining of the Union and Central Pacific railroads at Promontory Point, Utah, in 1869, was discovered by Union Pacific officials and supplied the director with valuable information concerning the incident.

Colonel Burke, another Civil War veteran, also came to the rescue.

"is largely a matter of correct and complete control of the muscles and nerves. In my opinion, nothing is so conducive to graceful movements as classic and ballroom dancing. I think every woman should also partake of breathing and body exercises every morning and night."

"A woman should practice making certain moves—moves that are common in her everyday actions—until she is able to do them in the most graceful manner possible. I believe grace is attainable by any woman if she but strives to attain it. And I don't believe the woman lives who does not desire to be graceful at all times."

"Forget-Me-Not," showing today only at the Oregon, reproduces with great fidelity the life story of two foundlings.

In the orphanage where her mother had left her as a baby, Ann Gordon had found one congenial soul, another foundling named Jimmy. But one day there comes a rich woman who chooses Jimmie for adoption and Ann is left alone. The other children eventually find homes but no one wants the little girl. A street musician takes pity on her and she goes to share his meagre one-room home. Thus the paths of the two child-hood sweethearts diverge, but through the long years Ann carries the memory of Jimmy and from it draws inspiration and courage in her struggle to become a successful violinist.

A remarkable photoplay in every respect is "The Face in the Fog," a picture in which Lionel Barrymore and Seena Owen have the featured roles. It closes at the Liberty tonight. The story deals with the efforts of a band of Russian crooks to rob a refugee of the crown jewels and how they are foiled by Boston Blackie Dawson, a reformed American crook. It is well worth while.

Senator Tooe's Bill Would Relieve Clerks

A bill introduced by Senator Tooe would make it unnecessary for the county clerk to report to the secretary of state the names of electors who register, change residences within the county where registered or remove from one county to another when this involves change either of name, post-office address or political party, or when, for any reason the registration of an elector shall have been cancelled or rendered void by death.

tributed and the farmer is paying more than his just share of said burden; and,

Whereas, this condition can only be corrected by having all of the property of the state assessed upon a uniform basis; therefore,

Resolved, that Marion Pomona Grange of Patrons of Husbandry takes this opportunity of going on record of an equalization of the tax burden by the enactment of a law that will compel the assessment of all property at its full cash value.

Consolidation Urged
Whereas, there are pending in the legislature certain bills, the purpose of which is the consolidation of certain state governmental functions; and,

Whereas, such consolidation would make for more economical administration of state affairs, and place responsibility upon elected officials; therefore,

Resolved, that Marion County Grange of Patrons of Husbandry endorses the principle of consolidation, and urges upon the Marion county members of the legislature the importance of enacting a consolidation law at the present session of the legislature; and,

Resolved, further, that such consolidation should provide for the centering of responsibility of the whole state government in the governor, similar to the way in which the national government centers responsibility in the president.

Hold Road Contracts
Whereas, there has been widespread dissatisfaction with the idea that the present commissioners will enter into contracts of such a character as to have provided for the spending of the available funds of the state for road construction before the said present highway commissioners shall vacate the positions now held by them; therefore,

Resolved, that Marion County Grange of Patrons of Husbandry believes it the duty of Governor Pierce to take such steps

as may be necessary to prevent the tying up of the road funds in such contracts by the present highway commissioners.

Auto and Gas Tax

Whereas, the present automobile law is unjust and must be changed if the purpose for which it was enacted is to be attained; therefore,

Resolved, that the Marion County Grange of Patrons of Husbandry favors such a change in the automobile law as will assess automobiles on a more equitable basis, and further,

Resolved, that the tax burden of road construction and maintenance should be borne more nearly in proportion as they are used, and to this end, we recommend that the tax on gasoline be increased, and the license fees of automobiles be reduced.

Income Tax Favored

Whereas, real property is paying more than its just share of the taxes of the state; and,

Whereas, the Grange graduated income tax measure was denied a place on the ballot; and,

Whereas, the Grange graduated income tax bill is to be submitted to the legislative assembly at its present session; therefore,

Resolved that Marion Pomona Grange not only endorses the said bill, but calls upon all of its members to do every thing possible to have this measure enacted into law; and further,

Resolved, that we call upon the Marion county members of the legislature to support the Grange graduated income tax bill and use every just means to have same enacted into law.

McMahan Explains Bill
Representative L. H. McMahan of Marion county appeared before the body to explain his bills calling for the payment of tuition by all students in the two great state schools the university and the state agricultural college; \$100 a year for Oregon students, and the actual cost as it may be determined by the figures, for students from outside the state. Mr. McMahan has this matter already before the legislature in two separate

FUND TO FIGHT BOOZE PROPOSED

Eddy Has Bill That Would Turn Fines Into County and State Coffers

Senator Eddy yesterday introduced a bill providing that monies collected from fines, forfeitures or otherwise for violation of the liquor laws of the state, or from sales of property forfeited for that reason shall be paid to the county treasurers and set aside as a special fund.

One-half of this fund in each county would be limited to the state treasurer and set aside as a special fund to be used by the governor in the enforcement of the prohibition law. The remaining half to the amount of \$2000 in each county would be set aside as a special continuing fund for the use of district attorneys and special prosecutors in the enforcement of the prohibition laws.

The bill provides for the payment from this fund of compensation, one for each institution.

The figures, as he explains them, show that the 1100 non-Oregon students at OAC would pay to the state about \$300 apiece, which is the cost per capita per year as he has estimated it, and approximately the same figures would prevail in regard to the state university; the state absorbing the difference between the \$300 actual cost and the \$100 charged for tuition for the home students. On this showing that the state would receive a revenue of close to a million dollars yearly, and make the institutions practically self-supporting, the Grange gave the two measures vociferous endorsement.

sation to any special prosecutor and for the payment of certain expenses incurred by district attorneys and special prosecutors in liquor cases.

Salmon Fry Would be Tossed Back in River

To protect the salmon of the state, Senator Tooe yesterday introduced a bill requiring that 85 per cent of all salmon spawn or salmon fry from spawn taken from the waters of Oregon shall be returned to the stream from which they are taken or at a point nearer the headwaters. The other 15 per cent may be placed in other streams. Violation of the act would be classed as a misdemeanor and would be punishable by fine of not less than \$100 and by imprisonment in the county jail 30 days, or by a fine of not more than \$1000 and by not more than a year in jail.

Brown Bill Would Allow Farm Peddlers Unlicensed

To encourage the marketing of agricultural produce in the purpose of a bill introduced by Senator Brown of Marion, providing that no license fee shall be exacted by a city or town from a producer or his agents who go into the city to peddle produce about the city.
