Yet in spite of this expenditure and the large appropriation for the coming year for road building, the road-building program is not keeping pace with the increase of the automobile. The expenditure of roads per car registered in 1910 was approximately \$211 and in 1920 approximately \$54.

"But a big factor to offset this is the fact that roads are being built more substantially than ever before. The road building program is one of the most necessary and most beneficial things that the country can do. It increases incidentally, the value of real estate, the value of farm land, knits communities together and serves to expedite commerce."
