Dallas Improvement Bonds Sell For Good Price

DALLAS, Or., Jan. 25.—(Special to The Statesman.)—At a special meeting of the Dallas city council Monday evening bids for \$2373.90 worth of improvement bonds were opened and the entire amount sold to Frank J. Coad as the highest bidder. The bonds sold for \$101.05. Another bid of W. L. Soehren of this city was for \$101.

Several other matters of importance in city affairs were brought up and discussed among them being the proposed new sewer system which the city council feels should be constructed during the coming summer to afford a drainage for the south part of town in the industrial district.

This district is at present without any sewer and during the winter weather large areas are under water. The industries located in this district also want a sewer and the matter of voting bonds for the building of a new septic tank will be taken up at a special election to be held sometime within the next two months. It is also proposed at that time to vote on the building of a new water main for fire protection only in the industrial district.

It is believed by the council that \$15,000 will be sufficient to lay the 10-inch water pipe from the intersection of Court and Church streets down the SP tracks and through the district and the council is of the opinion that the people will gladly vote this amount. Once before the matter was taken up, but at that time it was thought that it would require \$25,000 to build the main and the amount was thought to be prohibitive.

Man Shadowed His Wife, She Would Have Divorce

Charging that her husband is possessed of a morose disposition and constantly shadows her on the streets, beats her, chokes her and generally makes life unbearable, Bessie R. Lane brought suit for divorce against her husband, Edward G. Lane, in the circuit court yesterday.

She charges that about one year after their marriage, which was in March 1916, her husband began heaping personal indignities upon her until she was finally forced to leave his domicile and seek quarters of her own. Upon frequent occasions she asserts he beat her and at one time wrenched her back, causing her much pain and discomfort.

The Lanes have two children, one aged 5, the other 3. They were married at Eugene, Or., in March, 1916.

Notaries Are Affected by Mr. Moser's Measure

Under a bill introduced by Senator Moser yesterday notarial certificates issued by the governor would be sent by the secretary of state to the county clerk in which the applicant resides instead of to the applicant directly. The secretary of state would notify the applicant that the certificate had been sent and it would then be obligatory for the applicant to go to the county clerk's office and sign the notaries' register.
