Although they receive no compensation for the great amount of time given toward the production of three big concerts each season, the Apollo club boys feel that being an active member, like virtue, is its own reward," says one of the members, "and then there is the keen fascination in developing a program from the first glimpse of the new songs to the grand finale when these songs finished, tried and true, are waited forth for the pleasure of the club's many friends. The process is not unlike the mining, cutting and polishing of precious gems, since, from the rough "first time over" to the concert rendition is indeed a far cry.

The educational value and character building qualities of active participation in the work of the Apollo club are big factors in holding the singers together. To sit under the baton of a director such as Prof. John E. Sites and gain a considerable knowledge of the beauties and intricacies of song and its possible harmonies is considered by the members as being abundantly worth all of the time and effort required for the success of the club's mission.

Singing together throughout the many weeks previous to a concert, the development of the esprit de corps among the singers comes automatically.

Perhaps not many of its host of admirers appreciate the significance of the club's "motto" when it is heroically and harmoniously pealed forth as a prelude to each of the concert programs. In the Latin it reads: "Ecce quam bonum, quam que jucundum habitare in fratre unum." It's a standing gag with the boys, when they sing it for themselves, that "Al Gille will now give us the translation of this charming sentiment." Sure enough, Al lifts his "first bass" voice and growls, "Aw shucks! It means, Behold! How good it is for brethren to dwell together in unity, or something to that effect."

Salem is to be treated to a concert by one of the country's really great artists. On Tuesday evening, February 20, Paul Althouse, celebrated tenor of the Metropolitan Opera company, will sing at the armory. This concert is the second of the Salem Artist series, the first number having been given last October by Cyrena Van Gordon, prima donna contralto, of the Chicago Opera company.

Althouse has but recently returned from a concert tour of Australia where he sang in joint recital with Arthur Middleton, baritone.
