"One has only to visit some of the classes and to talk with ome of the women who are takng or who have completed coures to get an idea of their immense value to home-makersp," says Miss Wood. "The idea should not get abroad that we are trying to turn out finished products. These courses of instruction are of infinite help to women in meeting the problems at their homes."

The organizing of part-time classes is done by Miss Wood. Five full time itinerate teachers, who have been trained by the state supervisor through short courses given in Salem, then take charge. In some instances the local home economics teachers take the classes which consequently have to be held in the late afternoon or eveningin the school laboratory, in a local hall, or in homes where the equipment is adequate.

Classes are organized on the 24 or 36 hour basis in either two or three hour sessions and meet once or twice a week depending on the demands of the community. The courses offered are millinery, dressmaking, nutrition, child care, and house decor.

"Emphasis has been put this year on grading the courses and having women go from beginning to more advanced work. For instance in clothing work we have beginning sewingwhich is very elementary-advanced sewing, garment making, advanced garment making, and tafloring. We have women who have enrolled since last October who will have completed the entire gradation of courses in clothing work and who intend to complete the unit with trade tailoring. No credit is given. The entire cost to the women averages about 20 cents per les

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
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
