W. Beckley Speaks From Long Experience in Handling of Workers.

However, since we have no such winter problems as where bees are wintered in cellars, we can meet the situation by building up and having booming colonies, say from 50,-000 stand at honey flow time, to 80,000 worker bees, and leaving 75 to 150 pounds for each colony to winter on.
