

STANDISH CAME OF OLD FAMILY

Late Resident of Salem Direct Descendant of Mar-trial Pilgrim Hero.

The life of the late Garrett Standish, who died at his home on South Thirteenth street, and was buried Tuesday, is one of almost thrilling interest. Mr. Standish comes of one of the finest fighting families in all American history, and one of the oldest—for his direct ancestor, eight generations back, was Captain Miles Standish, who came with the Mayflower. The only older families in America are the copper-hued people who hid behind the bushes and watched the Pilgrims crawl out of the surf and roost shiveringly on bleak old Plymouth Rock. They have been warriors all the way down, warriors of the cleanest strain. The late Mr. Standish of Salem served two enlistments in the Civil war. His father served in the War of 1812, when the country needed fighting men worse than ever before or since. His father before him had served in the Revolutionary war. And so on back to the short, squat lion-hearted Captain of Plymouth. That is only half the interest in the story, however. Dr. George H. Alden, dean of Willamette university, is the direct descendant of the Mayflower Pilgrims who might have been

the ancestor of the Standishes in America—only that she chose the faithful scribe and the bashful lover and the fine-hearted John Alden, when he came a-courting in the name of the bold captain. If Miles Standish had only gone in person to ask about the wedding; the Alden and Standish families might today be transposed. The two men here in Salem have talked over their strangely intertwined history but they couldn't change it, so they have gone on with their names and heritages as they are.

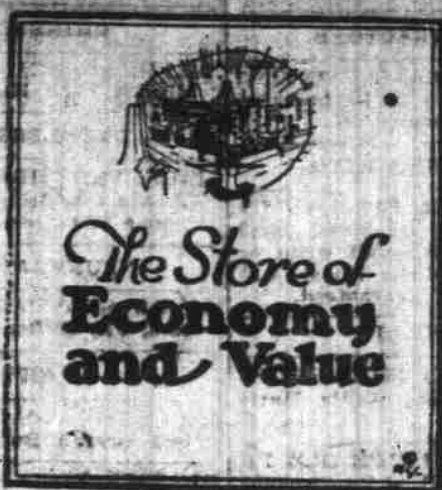
Mr. Standish was for years a member of Sedgwick Post, Grand Army of the Republic, and the post attended the funeral services of their deceased comrade in a body. The Odd Fellows lodge, of which he had been a member, officiated at the cemetery. Rev. Blaine E. Kirkpatrick preached the funeral sermon at the mortuary parlors.
