

CANNED FOODS DECLARED SAFE Preservation of Food Values Praised by High Authorities.

years warping American women against canned foods. I said, put them up at home or go without them. I beg them now to use canned foods. We are proud to have them on our table. Dr. Harvey W. Wiley the famous pure food expert, had this to say: "The canned food industry, more especially that portion of it represented by the National Association, has been foremost among the food industries in its endeavor to improve their output by the selection of good material, by sanitary factory methods, the improvement of the quality of the container and the abolition of the use of preservatives. While there are still undoubtedly many small canneries where these ideals are not attained, the trade as a whole has fallen into step with the work under the pure food law. "For seasons of natural shortage, for periods, places and times when fresh goods are not available, the canned goods fill a most important place in the modern diet, and the wholesomeness, palatability, and under modern conditions of life they are filling a larger and larger need."

Another time Dr. Wiley remarked he had quit growing peas upon his farm in Virginia, inasmuch as he could now buy better ones canned. United States Senator Bert M. Fernald, of Maine, himself a prominent canner, once said: "The packer of foods is an expert in his line. He learns to pack a single food in the very best way; he is a specialist in his business. If he desires to pack fancy corn, the finest in the world, he locates in Maine, builds an up-to-date cannery that is always clean and sanitary and from the delicious sweet corn picks an article that is such a luxury in winter, and at a cost much less than the same article could be purchased for even in its season. "If salmon is to be packed, then the canner would locate on the Columbia river or in the extreme northwest. And so each state or locality produces a particular fruit, vegetable, fish or meat adapted to its own section. "Canning establishments of today are equipped with modern automatic machinery, handling enormous quantities in a clean and most economical way. The tin can is one of the cheapest containers, a two-pound can cost-

ARCHITECT DOYLE UNABLE TO COME Willamette Gymnasium Plans Not Discussed at Wednesday Meeting.

Because of the illness of Architect A. E. Doyle of Portland, the executive board of Willamette university that met Wednesday did not have the gymnasium plans to inspect or discuss. The tentative plans have been drawn, ready for consideration, but they will have to be presented at a later date. Lumber Production Two Per Cent Below Normal

One hundred and thirty-nine mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending February 24 manufactured 91,964,414 feet of lumber; sold 92,385,156 feet, and shipped 111,953,156 feet. Production for reporting mills was 2 per cent below normal. New business was one-half per cent above production. Shipments were 21 per cent above new business. Thirty-nine per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to 26,376,699 feet, of which 27,179,699 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and 9,195,000 feet export. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 1723 cars. Thirty-nine per cent of the week's lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 43,702,205 feet, of which 2,283,179 feet moved coastwise, and 9,419,106 feet overseas. Rail shipments totaled 2131 cars. Local auto and team deliveries totaled 4,320,871 feet. Unfilled domestic cargo orders total 175,395,386 feet. Unfilled export orders \$2,197,552 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders, 11,292 cars.
