HAILHUAD SHARES

Profit Taking and Bullish Demonstrations Fail to Affect Market.

NEW YORK, March 3 .- Railroad shares were bid up vigorously in today's brief but active session of the stock market while heavy profit taking sales were being made in the industrial lagging behind the market, in belated response to the sub-2.25 stantial improvement in earnings shown by the January earnings reports over those of the same month last year.

At the end of the session, the 10.00 average price of 20 leading railroad stocks was at the highest 11.50 figure since April 1920. Steels which were strong yesterday, slipped back today but not until after a new peak price had been established by United States Steel common at 108 7-8, Bethlehem B at 71 7-8 and Republic

at 61 3-8. Operations of steel mills are now reported to be about 90 per cent of capacity with several mills closing their books until a substantial reduction has been made in present unfilled orders. Despite the unusually heavy demand for steel, the United States corporation's monthly tonnage statement next -Saturday is not 5.00 expected to show much change because of the large volume of lusiness turned down by the company.

There were a few strong spots in the specialty list. Foreign exchanges were firmer with business more active. Demand sterling sold around 4.70 1-4 and French francs were again quoted above 6.10 cents.
