## Reclamation Project to Undergo Inspection

The state irrigation and drainage securities commission, including Governor Pierce, will leave Portland March 13 for Vale for the purpose of inspecting the Warm Springs irrigation project which has applied to the commission for an extension of the time of state guarantee of interest. On a portion of the bond issue the district asks an extension of six months and on a portion an extension of one year.

At a session yesterday the commission took the attitude, after conferring with representatives of the state highway department, that it is not advisable for the highway department to construct the Dalles-California highway through the site of the proposed Benham Falls reservoir in Deschutes county. The route extends directly through the site, and the commission is certain that the reservoir will ultimately be built.

The commission yesterday certified \$10,000 bonds for the Gold Hill irrigation district.
