Elsman Not Guilty.—The non-support charge filed by Elsie M. Elsman against her husband, Harry J. MOTORISTS SEEK BIG MEMBERSHIP

Vigorous Campaign Starts With O. K. DeWitt Head-Movement Here.

A vigorous campaign for members in the Oregon State Motor association is to be begun at once, all over the state. O. K. DeWitt is to push the matter in the Salem district.

The association aims to interest as far as possible every motorist in the state. It proposes to carry on a regular campaign for good road legislation of every kind, road information for travelers, free towing service, road marking, a fight to the death on hold-up garages, hotels and other travel sharks, and, perhaps, the biggest thing of all, a saving of 35 to 50 per cent on car insurance, as well as a systematic campaign for the recovery of stolen cars.

There are two great auto clubs in California, and the American Automobile association, in which the Oregon organization is to be affiliated, operates in 45 of the 48 states of the union. A. H. Lea, former secretary of the state fair, is president. Mayor George Baker, Joe Dunne and Phil McSchan of Portland are members of the board of directors, and they are looking for everybody to be on the list of common members.

STIFF JOLT GIVEN HICKEY

Five Hundred Dollars Fine and Six Months in Jail, Says Bushey.

When Robert Hickey of Mount Angel, charged with possession of whiskey and a still, stood before Judge W. M. Bushey in the county court late yesterday afternoon, he did not know that his case was the "cabbage" of a long train of violations which has been harassing the court during the past few months. Nor did he know that the patience of Judge Bushey had reached the breaking point.

"Well, what have you to say?" asked the judge. "Guilty," replied Hickey easily. "Five hundred dollars fine and six months in the county jail," shot back Judge Bushey.

Sheriff Oscar Bower and Deputy Sheriff Walter Barber arrested Hickey early Sunday morning at his home in Mount Angel. One gallon of whiskey and a still were found on his premises. His partner, Leo Wild, was arrested a short time before on a liquor charge just inside the Clackamas line. Hickey who was confined in the county jail last night now has only 179 more days to go.
