ELLIOTT VIEWS FILM ON FIRES

Menace to Forests Shown by Motion Picture in Portland Theatre

State Forester J. A. Elliott went to Portland Monday to view three reels of films that were taken in Oregon last fall, to illustrate forestry conditions in the northwest woods. The title of the film is "The Red Enemy," the story of fire. The films were taken by the state, the lumbermen's association, and the national government, working in conjunction to produce a picture for national circulation.

The picture starts with a magnificent tree, standing supreme in the forest. It is cut up and followed through every process of logging and mill manufacture, down to the charming home that it will build. That, however, is only one part of the story. The other is the development of a fire that, starting as a little, foolish spark, grows into a tremendous forest fire that ravages home after home in its path. Some striking scenes are shown of settlers driven out by "the red enemy," the fire.

Some airplane patrol work is shown in the film, and bits from many kinds of forest life. The original was taken for a three-reel film, though it was cut back at Washington to only two full rolls. The film is being shown through the Portland office of the national forest service. The exact plan for distribution has not yet been decided upon, though one proposal is to make up a number of films, and loan them for circuit use all over the nation, so as to give the pictures the widest possible publicity.

DONEY ADDRESSES LOCAL KIWANIS

Willamette President Presents Some Evidences of Christianity

"There is a Green Hill Far Away," and if it is as beautiful as Miss Iva Claire Love, violiniste, pictured it as she placed it to the Kiwanis club luncheon Tuesday noon, the Kiwanis club is unanimous to go there. Maybe they haven't all known the road; but the Passion Week address of Dr. Carl G. Doney, the principal speaker for the day, gave some of them an inkling of what to do to go there, and they cheered both the music and the speaker as if they would all be on the road and traveling fast.

The attendance prize for the day was given by G. E. Terwilliger, a miniature oak casket, with a rag doll patient and a versified dedication of a \$5 cash-trade order on one of the Kiwanian stores. It was won by M. T. Madsen, of the Dixie Bakery, amid loud applause.

Dr. Doney, president of Willamette, gave some of the evidences of Christianity as they are inescapable to the honest, thoughtful mind. He held that it matters infinitely to every man what he shall believe as to immortality. It takes a more than human ability to live even decently, he said, if there is no hereafter to correct some of the wrongs of this life. He held that the honest man, in judging of Christianity as a reality, must treat it as he would other evidence, by giving it the same square deal in conditions as any other theory.

He asserted that all men believe in immortality; that there is something within man that cannot die. Science says that force is everlasting. It may be directed into new channels, but it cannot be permanently lost. The spirit, the ability to live, is immortal. To make the world right, one need only to let the belief have its rightful development. He believes with Dr. Bashford, the eminent college president and Christian statesman, that the death-bed stories of people who profess to see into the spirit world, have only one possible explanation—that they actually do see into the existence beyond this mortal life.

SALEM HEIGHTS GALLANT HOST

County Community Federation Entertained—Mount Angel Is Next

A crowd that jammed the aisles and glued itself up against the walls and craned its neck to see in through the doors and windows, greeted the Salem Heights reception to the Marion County Community federation last night. It was the biggest, busiest crowd in the history of the organization. And one of the hungriest, until the luncheon had been literally passed.

A. N. Fulkerson, secretary of the Salem Heights Community club, led in the community singing, which was especially good and big. President Joseph J. Keber of Mt. Angel presided at the business session. An exceptional number of outside delegates were present to represent their home towns. Three new communities were elected to membership—Auburn, and North Howell, and Brush College in Polk county.

The next meeting of the federation was officially set for April 23 at Mt. Angel. Governor Pierce was officially asked to attend as a guest and to address the meeting. He accepted and will talk on taxation.

The governor was present at Salem Heights and spoke briefly. He congratulated the local club on its especially noteworthy success in maintaining a working identity for so long a time, and on having made such progress in uniting city and country interests.

He spoke also of the exceptional development of the community friendship spirit in Marion county, which he said had no counterpart in the northwest. He congratulated the women of the affiliated communities on their cooperation to make these friendly meetings successful. He referred to the supreme court decision of a score of years ago, when they said that women weren't qualified to be county school superintendents because they did not have the ballot.

The governor said that he recently drove down from Portland, and he was able to visualize a population of a million people between here and Portland, and another million in the city of Portland alone. He believes that the ultimate capital of the west will be in the northwest, and not near the southern border of the United States.

The governor agrees that Argentine, that can deliver a fine beef steer, dressed and frozen to New York for \$50, can beat Oregon, where the taxes alone run to \$25 a steer. But with this country producing only 40 per cent of its wool, he sees the

time when the wool industry can be enormously increased. And with the northwest having the finest flax climate and soil in the world, he believes that flax should be a matter for everybody's concern. "I'll back it to the last of my ability, and opportunity," he said.

The governor says they're hunting for buyers for the three big cars at the penitentiary. He knows that a Ford can be operated cheaper than a Hudson Six, and he's offering somebody a bargain in big cars.
