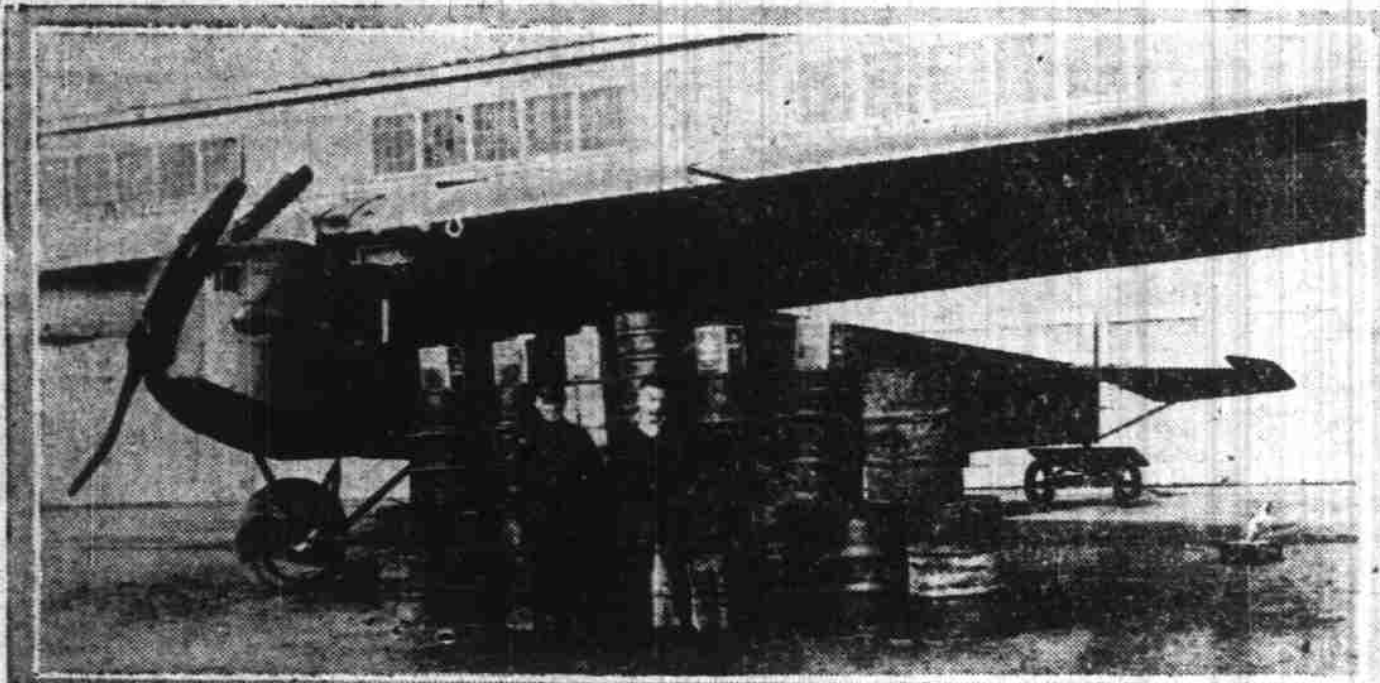

Track Is Constructed For Silverton Athletes

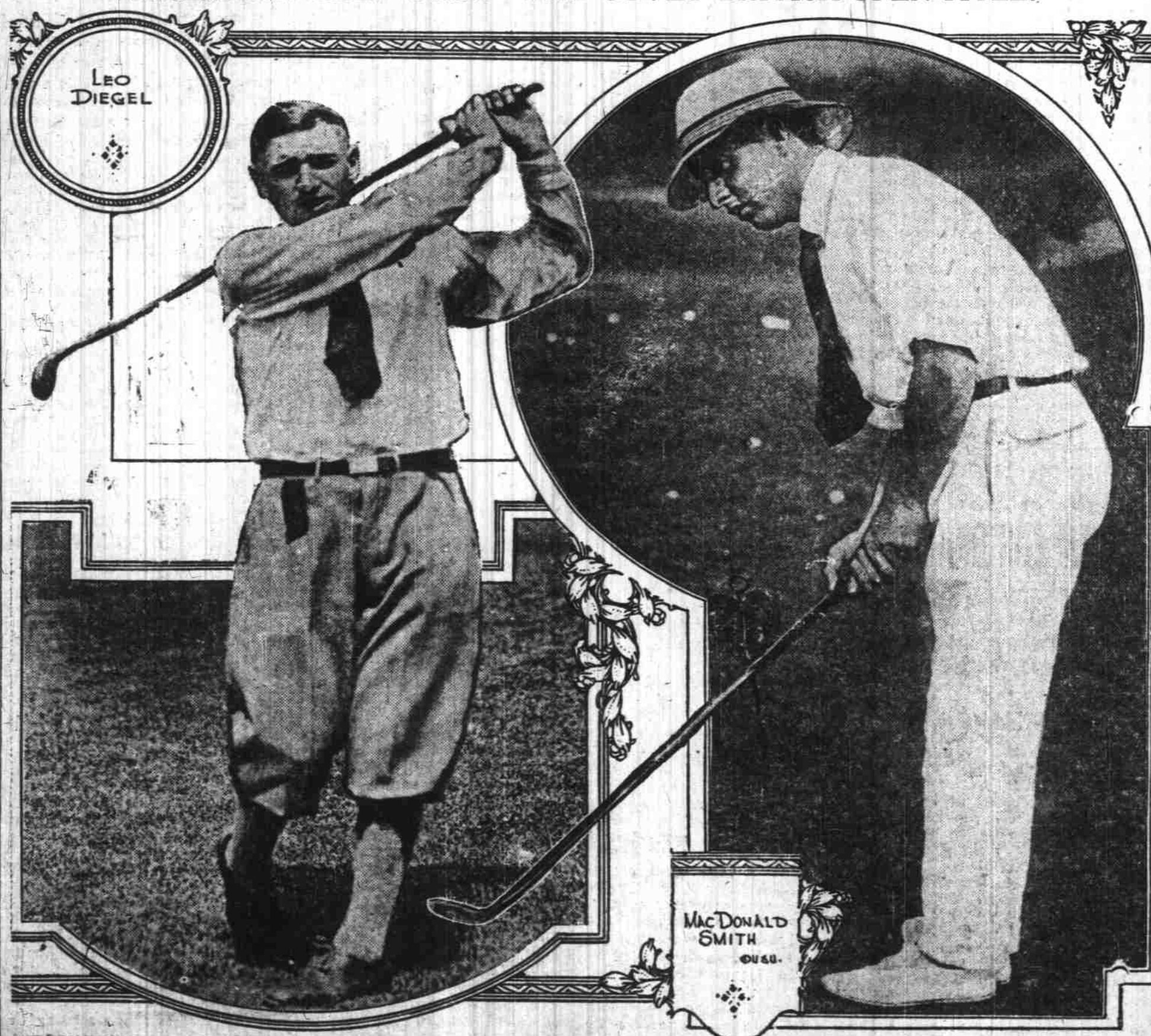
SILVERTON, Or., March 28.—(Special to The Statesman.)—The Silverton high school is to have a track. It is already under construction on the vacant school property back of the Eugene Field school building, across from the high school. Although the track isn't as large as desired, it will furnish adequate facilities for track training for the local team. When completed it will be one-eighth of a mile long. It will measure 15 feet across on the straight-aways and 13 feet on the curves. The track will be four inches deep and will be covered with decomposed granite. On the field inside the track will be constructed jumping pits and a girl's baseball diamond will also be laid off in the center. A great deal of the work was done by student volunteers. The students were assisted by the school board and by the Parent-Teacher association.

**PARTY RETURNS
FROM TRIP NORTH**
Delegation From YMCA Reports Successful Tour of Associations

C. A. Kel's and Dwight Findley returned last night from the five day's YMCA Willamette tour of the northwest Y circuit as far as Seattle. One of the boys, Ellsworth Anslow, remained in Seattle for a further visit, and Everett Lisle, Fred Warren, Paul Sherwood and Lyman Marsters stopped over one more night in Portland, to drive home this morning.

They had a wonderful trip, according to Mr. Kelis. They visited the associations at Portland, Centralia, Seattle, Tacoma, Olympia and Longview. This last is the great lumber city near Kelso, being built by the Long-Bell company that is putting in the big sawmills there. They have built a temporary Y for immediate service for the camp, while the mill proper is being built. Later a magnificent Y building is planned for construction as one of the first and most necessary business investments.

In all of the cities the local associations gave the visitors the very last word in hospitality and assistance. In Seattle they heard Dr. W. T. Grenfell, the Labrador missionary and explorer. Sunday afternoon and Dr. G. Campbell Morgan, a famous English divine, in the evening. Monday they spent the whole day with the Seattle association heads, so busy that they even missed their luncheon at noon. Tuesday they went to Tacoma, leaving there Wednesday morning, and stopping in Olympia and Longview during the day. They got to Portland Wednesday night.
