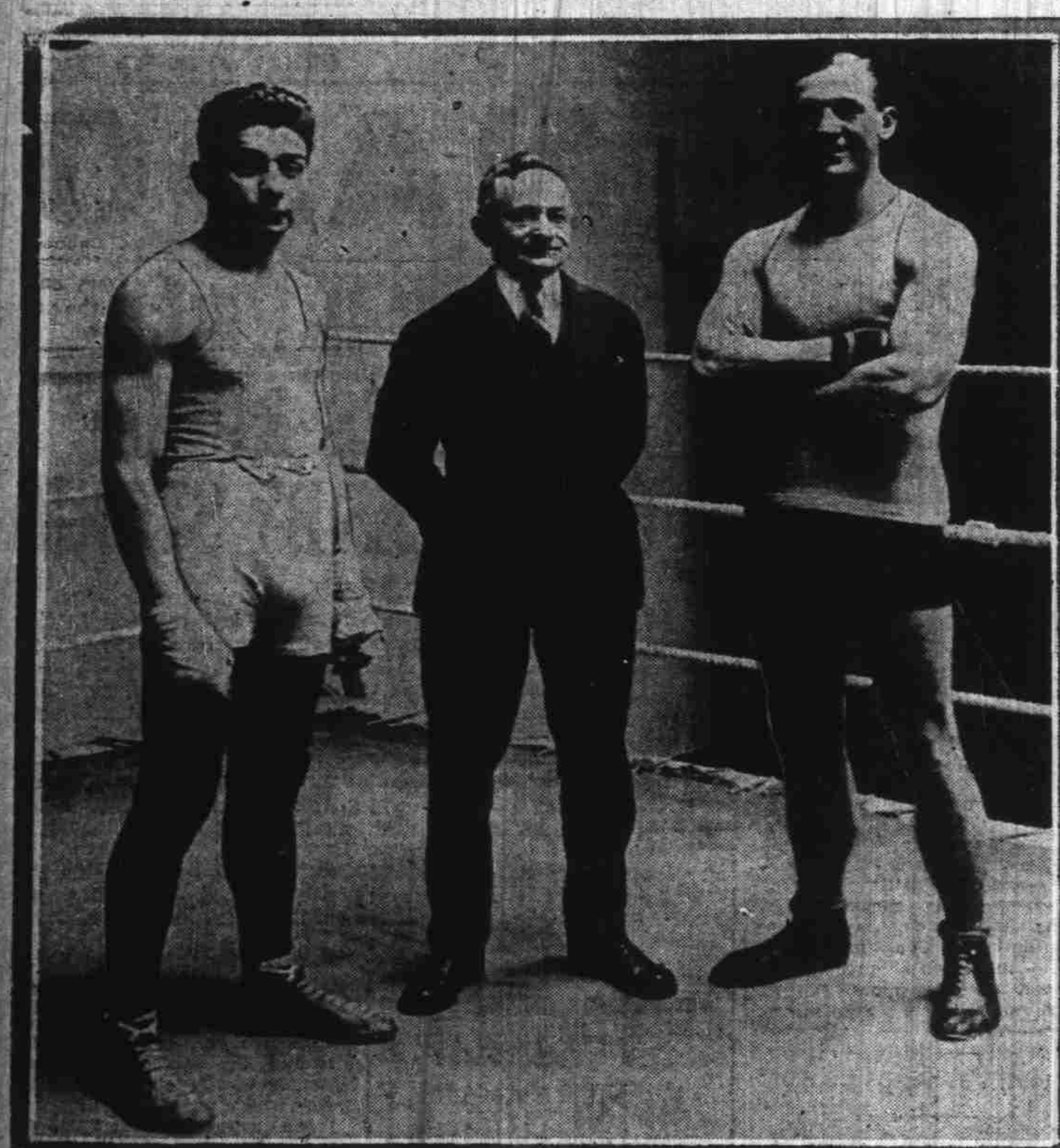

SIXTEEN TEAMS REMAIN IN FIGHT

Championship Honors at Inter-scholastic Tournament Closely Contested

CHICAGO, April 4.—Sixteen teams from about as many states remained tonight in the race for championship honors in the national invitation inter-scholastic basketball tournament at the University of Chicago, after a grueling second round elimination session of 15 hours in which 14 aspirants for national supremacy were put out of the running.

Eight games tomorrow, started at 9 o'clock, will give the winning teams of today, round 4, opportunity to display their wares. Westport high of Kansas City, Missouri champion, will meet the Bellevue high, runners-up in the Ohio play, in the opening game.

Westport won the right to play in the third round in a victory over Birmingham's Simpson high school, Alabama champions, today. The score was 21 to 24.

In the second game Rockford will clash with Scott high of Toledo. Brilliant play, with close scores the rule, marked the second round play. Several entries lost their game in the last minutes of play.

Charleston high from South Carolina, and Scott high, Toledo, shared honors for superiority of play today with a quintet of six-footers from Mesa, Ariz., close on their heels. Charleston won great applause for its smooth and faultless play which resulted in a 32 to 20 victory over Natick, Ohio, Pennsylvania champions.

Weston, Idaho, won from Asheville, North Carolina champions, 40 to 29. The score at the half was 26 to 5 in favor of the Westons, and the North Carolinians took a spurt early in the second half but were unable to overcome the Westerners' long lead.

Hand Wins Wrestling Match at Cottage Grove
EUGENE, Or., April 4.—In a wrestling match between Ralph Hand of Cottage Grove and Geo. Barnes of Portland, at Cottage Grove last night, Barnes' ankle was broken and Hand was awarded the match after 50 minutes of wrestling. This was the third match between the two men, the first one being a draw and the second was won by Hand when Barnes was injured.

OAKLAND LOSES TO LOS ANGELES

All Other Games in Pacific Coast League Stopped by Rain Yesterday

LOS ANGELES, April 4.—Los Angeles evened up with Oakland today, taking the second game of the series 4 to 1. The Angels took a one-run lead in the first inning when Carroll walked and scored on Deal's double to right field. Oakland tied the tally in the fifth, with a walk, a single and two sacrifice hits, but the Angels clinched the game in the eighth by a raid on the Oaks' infield, during which three runs were scored.

GENARO BEATS BUDDY TAYLOR

Joe Lynch Defeats Midget Smith—10,000 Witness Big Chicago Match

COLISEUM, Chicago, April 4.—(By The Associated Press.)—Before more than 10,000 spectators the biggest crowd that ever witnessed an indoor athletic show in Chicago, Joe Lynch, world's bantamweight champion defeated Midget Smith of New York, while Frankie Genaro, American flyweight champion outpointed Buddy Taylor of Terre Haute, Ind., in two sensational ten round contests tonight.

Genaro, with his five feet, one inch, fought as much in the air as he did with both feet on the canvas and hit Taylor with such a terrific compilation of punches that he had the crowd screaming.

After a dizzy first round which went to Taylor, Genaro warmed up to his task, permitting Taylor to do a lot of the leading while he satisfied himself with stiff and accurate countering with rights and lefts.

Taylor was credited with winning the first, fourth and tenth rounds while the third was fairly even.

Genaro was in front in the second, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth.

Lynch Takes Drubbing
Lynch outpointed Smith but left the ring with the knowledge that he had been in a desperate battle.

In the first round Lynch split Smith's upper lip and cut his tongue with a sharp right and also opened up an old wound on his nose. The midget went to his corner bleeding profusely.

Coming out for the second, Smith with blood dripping down his naked chest, waded in with rights and lefts.

As the peaked-face Lynch backed away, Smith shot over a vicious right cross, hitting Lynch squarely on the chin and knocking him flat. He tried to get up at the count of three but his legs would not support him and he waited until the referee counted nine before staggering into a fighting position.

Lynch Forces Pace
Smith tore after him and sent him reeling into the ropes at the bell with a left hook to the chin. That Lynch was hurt badly was shown by the stiff legged manner in which he came up for the third.

He fought defensively with Smith leading to the body and head. In the fourth, however, Lynch had shaken the cobwebs from his dizzy brain and began to pile up points to the seventh, using a long rangy left which he kept sticking into the midget's bloody face.

Smith won the seventh by solid right hand punches, forcing Lynch to the ropes. The ninth was even. Lynch came out strong in the tenth and forced the pace.

ing of its kind in Chicago and the scene of half a dozen Republican conventions, was packed to standing room capacity with an estimated attendance of 10,000 to 12,000 men and women when the first preliminary started. The gate receipts with tickets selling at \$3 to \$10, were around the \$58,000 mark.

With the house nearly sold out in advance, disappointed fans offered as high as \$30 for a choice \$10 ticket. Outside the police nabbed a daring individual who was doing land office business on the sidewalk, selling counterfeit tickets to the unsuspecting for \$3 as fast as he could hand them out.

With boxing staged "under cover" in Chicago for the last six months, tonight's program was the most pretentious held here in 2 years, since the memorable fake between Terry McGovern and Joe Gans, the fight that resulted in clamping the lid on the sport.

CHECK FOR FLAX COMES TO PRISON

Linen Thread Company of New York Pays for Quantity of Salem Tow

A check for \$23,469 was received at the penitentiary Wednesday from the Linen Thread company of New York, in payment for two cars of flax tow shipped the company from the Oregon state penitentiary plant.

There is still another car of flax material on hand in the prison storage, to make another car of the tow. It may run up to \$15,000 worth. This will be worked up and sold.

Under the contract with the Willamette Valley Flax & Hemp association, the prison factory will work up the flax on contract. There will be enough of this to keep the plant busy most of the season. There is also some hemp to work up into cordage fiber. Some of this is under contract to a Portland cordage works.

Getting ready for the big, permanent flax industry that is to start in the fall, the prison will be busy in building the rough machinery and preparing for a big run. The flax spinning machinery has to be imported from Ireland. There has been no big linen industry in the United States, and the Irish have had the lion's share of both the manufacturing and of the machine-making.

Oregon Aggie Football Team Invited to Hawaii

CORVALLIS, Or., April 4.—A cablegram was received at Oregon Agricultural college today inviting the football team of that institution to go to Honolulu for a Christmas game with the University of Hawaii. The invitation will be accepted, it was said. Coach Rutherford of the Aggie team said probably would take 18 men with him on the trip and that it was possible another game besides the one of Christmas day would be played by the Aggies while on the islands.

The luncheon will be given at cost. Special luncheons will also be served from time to time.

During the winter the 10 girls who are in the class have served luncheons attended by a total of 1886 people. This brought in a sum of \$150, making the department entirely self-supporting.
