SETS WORLD'S RECORD AT TIA JUANA TRACK.



Abadane, the wonder horse, Jockey Pablo Martinez up, who created a sensation in winter racing at Tia Juana, Mexico, when he set a world record of 1:39 2-5 for a mile and forty yards. This record was made in a match with Rebuke, pride of the celebrated stable of Commander J. K. L. Ross. Abadane in this victory topped a string of eight successive victories over distances from five and a half furlongs to one mile and a sixteenth, under various weights and different track conditions. Abadane, who is an eight-year-old gelding, was bred in France and is a son of Maboul II and Albo. His owner is the Wyoming businessman, C. B. Irwin. In setting the world mark the horse clipped time off the track records for six furlongs and one mile on the way.

RAILROAD BUDGET MEETS APPROVAL

Huge Expenditure of \$1,540,000 for Equipment Is Endorsed

NEW YORK, April 5.—The American Railway association today approved the expenditure by its members of \$1,540,000,000 for equipment, the biggest aggregate railroad budget ever recorded, then issued a nationwide appeal for cooperation in helping the roads through the heavy transportation era in history.

Basing estimates on the unprecedented tonnage hauled in recent months, the association's experts forecast the smashing of all records in 1923 with at least 13 weeks when car loadings will exceed 1,000,000 a week and an estimated high mark 1,080,000 cars predicted for the week of next October 20, at the height of the fall crop movement.

Realizing that, with existing facilities, they were unprepared for such a year, the railroads contracted for \$440,000,000 worth of supplies in 1922 and \$1,100,000,000 more for 1923. They also have speeded up shop repairs, reconstruction and maintenance of way departments to the point where they promise by fall to reduce the transportation of railroad coal and supplies to the minimum and to have a high percentage of rolling stock available for their customers.

Public assistance to help early transporting and storage of all freights, including coal, ore and construction materials that usually interfere with the fall movement of crops was asked by the conference.

themselves had less reverence. Mrs. Williams cited a case in 1902 when Howard Carter, then inspector in Northern Egypt, directed the removal of the mummy of Ammon-Hotep II, from the museum to its tomb in deference to the popular wish that the mummy be left where it was buried. Afterwards, however, ghouls robbed the tomb and tore the body to pieces in their search for valuables which did not exist.

It was pointed out that Canarvon himself had expressed the desire to have the mummy of Tut-enkhamun remain in the tomb.

CONFISCATOR OF WHISKEY SOUGHT

Carl Gross Said to Have Withdrawn 124 Barrels Stored in Warehouse

SAN FRANCISCO, April 5.—Federal prohibition authorities and San Francisco police were endeavoring tonight to locate Carl E. Gross, said to be the person who last Monday withdrew from the Filbert Street warehouse 124 barrels of whiskey owned by Adolph Harris, Inc., wholesale liquor dealer, in pre-prohibition days.

The whiskey was placed in the warehouse when prohibition became effective and after Harris' death constituted the largest asset of the Harris corporation, the stock in which is now held by three sons, Jerome, Melville and Arthur.

According to the story told to the federal authorities by Arthur Harris, he was approached last Saturday by Gross who offered him \$30,000 for his interest in the liquor. Harris consulted his brothers and agreed to the sale. The same day he escorted Gross to the warehouse, he said, and removed guards which he maintained over the liquor.

An investigation revealed the liquor had been withdrawn from the warehouse and a search was then started for Gross.

HERRIN DEFENSE RESTS ITS CASE

Nearly One Hundred Witnesses are Called to Alibis

MARION, Ill., (April 5.—(By the Associated Press).—The defense in the second Herrin riots trial rested its case today after having called nearly 100 witnesses to testify to alibis for the six defendants charged with the murder of Antonio Mulkovich, one of the 22 non-union men slain during the outbreak. Final arguments were expected to begin tomorrow.

Before resting, the defense directed all of its efforts toward establishing a complete alibi for Hugh Willis, state executive board member of the United Mine Workers and one of the defendants. Testimony also was introduced to show that Robert Tracy and Otis Lawrence, witnesses for the prosecution, were in jail at the time when they claimed they had seen the tragedy take place.

Tracy and Lawrence testified that they were working at the mine of the Southern Illinois Coal company and described how the 48 workers and guards in the mine were marched out by an armed crowd after they had surrendered. They said they had escaped when the prisoners were lined up before a barbed wire fence and 14 of them shot down.

Repair of Bridges Is Discussed at Albany

Marion county court officials met with the Linn county court in Albany yesterday morning for the purpose of reaching some definite agreement over the painting and repair work to be done this summer to bridges connecting the two counties over the Santiam.

Repair work now badly needed on these bridges has been neglected for the past three or four years according to William J. Culver, county roadmaster. Two steel bridges, the Stayton bridge and Green's bridge, will need painting and a change made in their flooring system, he claims. The Linn county court has agreed to cooperate on a 50-50 basis and work is expected to begin late in the spring.

Moore Company Receives Long Bell Plant Contract

KELSO, Wash., April 5.—The contract for construction of the Long-Bell Lumber company's immense power plant was awarded today to the Charles C. Moore company of San Francisco. Work will commence at once.

The cost is unofficially estimated at \$2,000,000. The plant will supply power to the mills, the city of Longview and logging camps. Ultimate development of \$20,000 horsepower is expected.

FRENCH EXPOSE HUN PROPAGANDA

Workers Advised to Cease Work and Threaten Soldiers of France

PARIS, April 5.—(By the Associated Press).—The French foreign office today gave out the text of a circular alleged to have been distributed by the German people's party among the manufacturers in Essen and which is regarded in official circles as part of the preparation for violent resistance to the occupational forces, such as they declare provoked the fatal encounter at the Krupp works last Saturday.

The circular, said to have been distributed in February and since quoted in the reichstag, is in the form of questions and answers, giving hints as to how the workmen may be incited to resist the French.

The document, as given out by the foreign office, reads in part: "Question: What do you do when French troops enter the works or endeavor to arrest workmen or functionaries?"

"Answer: Inform all the workmen at once; also call out all workers in the neighborhood by means of steam whistles so that as soon as possible they may surround the French troops and menace them with picks, hammers or anything available."

Second Lieutenants are Wanted in Regular Army

An examination for appointment as second lieutenant in the regular army is to be held at Military stations throughout the Ninth corps area during the week commencing June 25. There are approximately 85 vacancies to fill in the various branches of the service.

The candidates must be a citizen of the United States between the ages of 21 and 30 years of age, and having more than two years in the regular army, or a reserve officer, warrant officer or enlisted man of the national guard, or be a member of the enlisted reserve corps, or a graduate of a technical school approved by the secretary of war. A civilian who can pass the preliminary examination can qualify by enlisting in the reserve corps.

Applications can be made to the commanding officer, Vancouver Barracks, Wash., who will give the necessary information as to procedure. It is urged that those interested send in their applications early, that the preliminary board may take the necessary action.

There is a local examining board in Salem consisting of Col. Carle Abrams, commander of the 882nd regiment, reserve corps.
