

LAUSANNE HALL ROOMS DEMANDED

Applications Already Coming
in for Next Year's
Reservations

Applications are already coming in for reservations in Lausanne hall for next year's Willamette university registration.

Up until this year, there has been no trouble about accommodations. But now the hall is crowded and there is promise of a large enough increase in attendance that some will be left out. It is a case of the early comers getting the surest entrance, and they are applying this far in advance—almost six months before the school year opens.

This is expected to apply all through the university, until the new gym is completed, to furnish some possible added class room capacity.

The university doesn't undertake to provide anything for the boys, outside of class rooms, but even these are short of the demand. A good sport who wanted to immortalize his name could do so inside of 15 minutes by giving enough to build a fine, big science hall, a bargain at \$10,000 or thereabouts. It would be a monument and a benediction for a long time. Old Waller hall has stood for 50 years, and is better today than it was the day it was built. It has seen three partial destructions by fire, but the walls are as sturdy as the pyramids. Another adequate building, as well built and bearing the name of the donor as Eaton hall bears the name of the philanthropist who gave it, would be a delightful Christmas gift to about 200 more students every year who are waiting for the chance to get into Willamette for an education.

MARION COUNTY'S SHARE \$22,520

Tobin & Pierce Lowest Bidders for Bridge Over Pudding River

Marion county will co-operate with the state highway commission in meeting its share of construction of a bridge across Pudding river, according to information given out by the county court yesterday. A letter was received from the highway commission to the effect that the Marion county share would be \$22,520.38, or an increase of about \$4500 over the original estimated cost, due to the increase in the cost of steel and labor.

The lowest bid received was from Tobin & Pierce of Portland, who submitted a bid of \$77,545, which has been accepted by the council.

The bridge, which will connect Marion county with Clackamas

county, will cost the latter county about \$2,000, according to county authorities. This, it is explained, is due to the fact that Clackamas county has not provided for the approach to the bridge which Marion county did last year.

Filipino Student Leads Classes in Philosophy

From the records of Willamette university it is learned, that the star of all the stars—and there are several of exceptional capability—in the psychology and philosophy classes under Prof. C. L. Sherman, is Sinfrosa Padilla, a Filipino lad, a member of the sophomore class.

His work with Professor Sherman this year covers ethics, general psychology, and psychology of the sub-normal mind—a course almost as fierce as winning the world war, according to most of those who follow the Sherman leadership. George Isaac Newton
George Isaac Newton was born in Michigan July 17, 1854. He worked with his father, as a machinist, until, at the age of 16, an accident deprived him of his hand. At the age of 20 years, he moved to Iowa, where he engaged in farming, and where he married Mary Miriam Rosewell, who survives him. Mr. Newton also leaves two sons, Walter Newton of Santa Catalina Island and Neil Newton of Clatsop, Or. One brother, Thomas H. Newton of Clatsop, was a host of friends. Mr. Newton was highly esteemed by Modern Woodmen among whom he held a membership for many years.

Coming to Oregon in 1903 Mr. Newton has lived here continuously until the day of his death, which was Saturday, March 31, 1923.

ENFORCE LAW IS PURPOSE

Conference and Mass Meeting to Aid Prohibition Here on April 10

A law enforcement conference will be held in the WCTU hall of Salem April 10. The various temperance organizations have perfected an amalgamation of their forces and are contemplating an intensive campaign for a better enforcement of the prohibition laws. In the evening a mass meeting will be held at the First Christian Church.

The first session of the conference will begin at 10 o'clock. It will be in session throughout the day and culminate in a law enforcement mass meeting to be addressed by Mrs. Jackson Silbaugh, representing the National Woman's Christian Temperance union, and W. J. Herwig of Portland, representing the Anti-Saloon league, on the general subject of "Law Enforcement, the Necessity for it and Some of the Obstacles in Its Way."

Similar conferences are being held in all of the principal county seat towns of the state on this immediate itinerary. Mr. Herwig, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league of Oregon, and Mrs. Mary L. Mallett, state president Woman's Christian Temperance union, jointly, gave out the following interview:

"It is our firm conviction that there cannot be a wholesome enforcement of the prohibition law or any other law unless the sentiment of the people is thoroughly alive and the citizenship generally demands the enforcement of the law, and then back and uphold public officers in the aggressive enforcement of the same. It is our earnest hope that those who are interested in the enforcement of the law will heartily join in these conferences and thus lend their cooperation and influence in the creating of a stronger sentiment for law enforcement. These conferences will give officials and citizens an opportunity to council together and discuss local difficulties and remedy them. It is not too much to state that the entire future success of prohibition will depend upon the successful enforcement of the prohibition law. Here then is an opportunity for every 100 per cent law-abiding citizen to do his or her part in this crusade and help make Oregon the 'driest' dry state in the union."
