DEMPSEY-GIBBONS FIGHT PROPOSED

Champ Would Get \$200,000 to Box St. Paul Fighter on July Fourth

MILWAUKEE, Wis., April 6.—(By the Associated Press.)—Jack Dempsey, world's champion heavy-weight pugilist, has been made a headline offer of \$200,000 to meet Tommy Gibbons of St. Paul in a 15-round bout to a decision at Shelby, Mont., on July 4, according to Mike Collins, Minneapolis boxing promoter, and Eddie Kane, Gibbons' manager, who are in Milwaukee tonight.

According to Collins and Kane, \$150,000 is already in a bank in Montana. Dempsey has been informed, Collins said tonight, that \$50,000 will be turned over to him upon his signature of the articles; another \$50,000 will be deposited in a Montana bank to be paid Dempsey in case the fight does not go through, and that the champion would be paid \$100,000 24 hours prior to his entering the ring for the contest.

Jack Kearns, Dempsey's manager, has asked Collins to grant him a few days to consider the proposition, according to Promoter Collins.

All arrangements with state officials of Montana have been completed to hold the proposed bout, it was said.

Lockard Denies McCarthy Right of Investigation

SALEMAN, April 6.—A flat denial of the right of William H. FOUR TO GO INTO HOOP SEMI-FINAL

Contestants for National Scholastic Basketball Title Narrow Down

CHICAGO, April 6.—Muskegon, Mich., and Kansas City, Kan., and Charleston, S. C., and Rockford, Ill., will go into the semi-finals tomorrow afternoon in the national invitation inter-scholastic basketball tournament.

The Charleston-Rockford game will be played at 2:30 o'clock, and the Muskegon-Kansas City game at 4 o'clock. The losers of these two games will play at 8 o'clock tonight to determine third place winner and the finalists will go into action at 9 o'clock to determine first place winner.

The four games which brought out the semi-finals were the most exciting of the tournament.

In the last game, Rockford, Ill., on the short end of a 17 to 10 score at the end of the first half, forged into the lead during the last few seconds of play and won from Westport, Kansas City, 26 to 24.

The Muskegon, Mich., team also fought its way to the semi-finals, and landed there by a one point lead, defeating Osage, Iowa, 26 to 25.

The Kansas City, Kas., team, defeated Tilden, Chicago district champions 44 to 28, and performed the feat by sheer strength, going down the floor five abreast on offensive tactics, and mowing down the Chicago team before its defensive formation could be put in working order.

The Charleston, S. C., team overrode New Trier, of Chicago, 38 to 22, the Carolinians proving entirely too fast for the New Trier lads to maintain the pace. Charleston and Rockford continued tonight to rule the favorites to win the title.
