POULTRY LECTURE

Editor Statesman—Are poultrymen benefited or misled by lectures given by poultry feed manufacturers?

Have the Commercial club authorities been made to believe by certain business interests that the recent poultry lectures at the Commercial club rooms were not for the benefit of a certain seed manufacturer?

Are these lectures financed by a certain milling company of Portland, Oregon, or by the U. S. government or Canadian government?

If by a certain milling interest to foster the sale of their products, is it right to use school houses and Commercial club rooms to promote a private business?

If their lectures are financed by the United States government, does Uncle Sam think there is only one firm in the United States that knows how to make poultry feeds?

In referring to these lectures: Do poultrymen believe that it requires an airtight bag to preserve poultry feed?

We find that pure, clean and wholesome feed usually stays that way and does not require an airtight container.

Do the poultrymen believe that 50 per cent of the poultry have rods of worms in them?

Do the poultrymen believe that dried buttermilk is detrimental to poultry?

THINK VENDETTA CAUSE OF CRIME

Feud Over Killing of First Husband Thought Cause of Double Murder

NEW YORK, April 7.—Authorities investigating the murder of Mrs. Irene Blandino of Jersey City, and that of Miss Bessie McMahon of Utica, N. Y., whose hacked bodies were found in a road on Staten Island early yesterday, voiced the conviction tonight that the crime was the result of a vendetta. Bayonne police officials identified the body of Miss McMahon tonight as that of Miss Ethel Phillips, 17 years old, who lived with her parents in Bayonne. She disappeared from her home two weeks ago, police said.

Detective Captain von Wagner, in charge of the investigation, said he was endeavoring to learn the nature of information possessed by Mrs. Blandino regarding the murder of her first husband, Frank Bongiovanni, who is said to have been the leader of a gang in Jersey City, and who died several years ago after an artery in his leg had been severed by a stiletto. According to von Wagner, Mrs. Blandino had told intimate friends the names of men whom she suspected of having killed her first husband.

Uniform Certification For Teachers Advocated

SPOKANE, Wash., April 7.—Recommendation of a uniform certification law governing examination of teachers in the four Pacific northwestern states is expected to be made to the Inland Empire Teachers' association at its annual convention here April 4 to 6.

At last year's convention a committee of 20 members, five from each state, was named, under the chairmanship of Dr. Freeman Daughters of the University of Montana, to investigate and report to the association.

"With a uniform law in force, the holder of a certificate in any one state could teach in any other state in which the law was effective," said J. A. Burke of this city, secretary of the Inland Empire association. "After adoption of a uniform law has been effected in the four northwestern states, it is hoped that other states will adopt the same requirements."

In addition to lectures by prominent educators of the United States, and the usual sectional conferences of teachers of various subjects, entertainment features have been arranged by the program committee.
