

MORRIS BROS. ARE CURBED

State Securities Commission Disapproves Advertisement of Bonds

After the state irrigation and drainage securities commission had written a letter yesterday to the Morris Brothers corporation, charging them with breach of agreement in advertising for sale \$5,010,000 in bonds of the Jefferson water conservancy district prior to approval of the bonds by the commission, transaction with the district had been unanimously disapproved at a meeting of the commission yesterday morning, the commission was thrown into a muddle over the question of what actually had occurred at the morning meeting.

Views Are Different

Percy A. Capper, state engineer declared that the commission had unanimously agreed to wipe from the state entirely the proposed deal of the Morris Brothers with the Jefferson district. Governor Pierce averred that the commission simply had disapproved any action of Morris Brothers in advertising and selling the bonds prior to approval by the state. Attorney General Van Winkle's idea was that Pierce was correct as to the action that was taken but that the effect would be exactly what Capper contended for.

When the attention of Capper and Pierce was called to a statement in the letter to Morris Brothers to the effect that "it was therefore unanimously decided at a meeting of the commission held this morning to disapprove the transaction," which seemed to be at variance with the action of the morning meeting as authorized for publication Capper and Pierce at once hastened to the office of Attorney General Van Winkle to thresh the thing out. Frank C. Bramwell, state superintendent of banks, and O. P. Hoff, state treasurer, were not present at the afternoon meeting. It was decided that the governor's interpretation should be embodied in the letter.

Interims Possible

It is explained that even though the state has not yet certified the Jefferson district bonds and that since they are advertised for sale subject to approval of the commission, it is possible for Morris Brothers to sell them and issue interim certificates pending approval of the Morris Brothers Jefferson district transaction and certification of the bonds.

There is grave doubt whether the commission will approve the sale of the bonds by the district to Morris Brothers at 84 1/2, which is part of the proposed transaction, and there is a state law inhibiting the sale of the bonds by the district at less than 90 unless approval of the state commission is given.

The commission is to pass on the transaction at a meeting on April 17.

Text of Letter

The letter sent by the commission to Morris Brothers late yesterday reads:

"At a meeting of the irrigation and drainage securities commission on March 27, at which time your representatives, Mr. John L. Ethridge, Mr. Olaningham (and Mr. LeRoche appeared, requesting the approval of a circular and plan of circulation for the sale of the bonds of the Jefferson water conservancy district in the amount of approximately \$5,000,000, the following order was entered:

"After considerable discussion and objection by members of the commission to sending out the circular before the commission had made a further investigation of the project, it was ordered that the commission make an inspection of the project the latter part of next week while in central Oregon, and that the commission do not approve the issuance of said circular until it is known what action the commission would take with respect to certifying the bonds. This arrangement was agreed to by the representatives
