

CANNERY MAKES RAPID PROGRESS

Excavation Finished, Walls Going Up for New Industrial Concern

Rapid progress is being made on the Northwest Cannery company plant on South Liberty street, south of the armory. All the excavation has been done for the basement, the wall foundation is all laid up to the basement level and most of the forms are in position for the pillars and for the main walls. They will all be ready for pouring concrete by tonight at the present rate.

The building is to be one of the best constructed factory structures in the city. It will have abundance of room to make it one of the most efficient canneries in the white northwest. The installation of the most modern cannery equipment, especially laid out to put the perishable fruits through in the very shortest possible time will give it an exceptional capacity for its size. It is understood that it can handle up to 200,000 cases of goods a year. There is more than 1000 cubic yards of concrete to go into construction, and the workmen will be pouring 150 yards a day next week. The first of the canning season is only about seven weeks off, or even a little less than that at the rate the fruits are coming along at this time.

Just across the street, the new Traglo warehouse is fast getting ready for occupancy. The timbers are mostly taken down from the walls, which are properly seasoned and ready for the weather. The roof is being laid, and the window and other carpentry work is being rushed along as fast as possible. The warehouse has four freight doors on the south or railroad front, and a like number on the Liberty street front for truck service. There will be elevator service to care for the traffic from this main working floor, to the basement and to the second floor. It should be only a very short time until the building is finished ready for storage use. Each floor contains practically a full half acre of usable space.

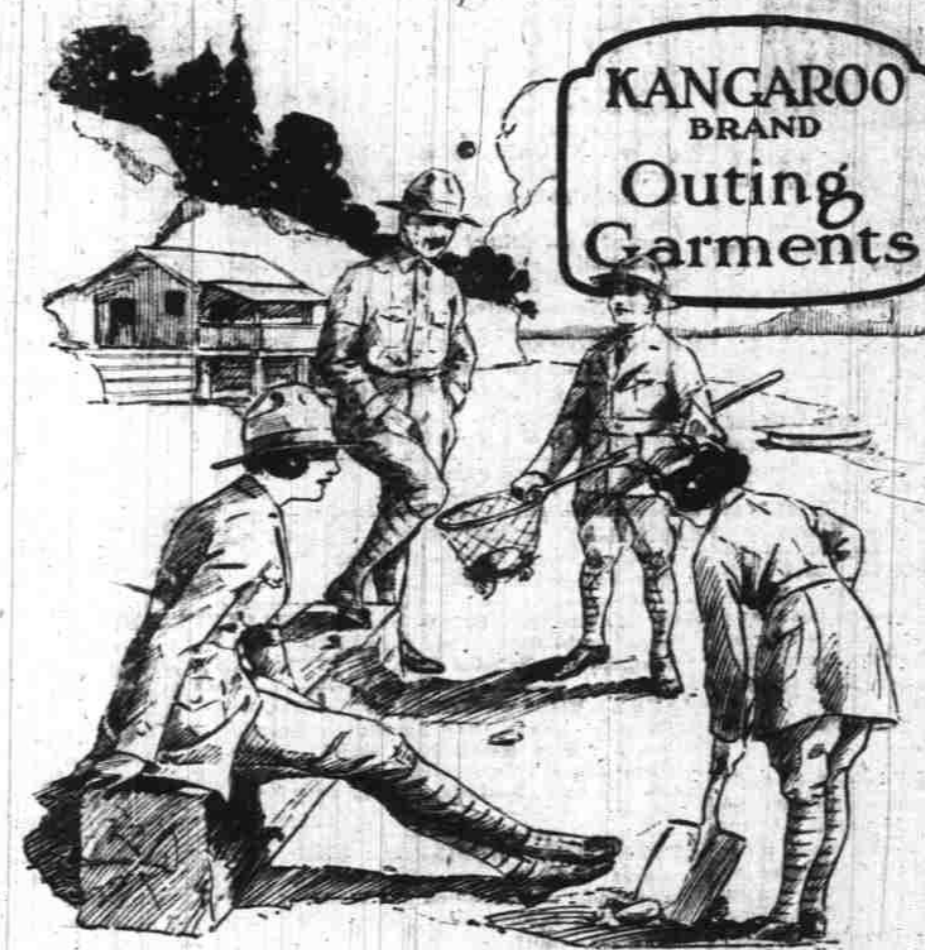

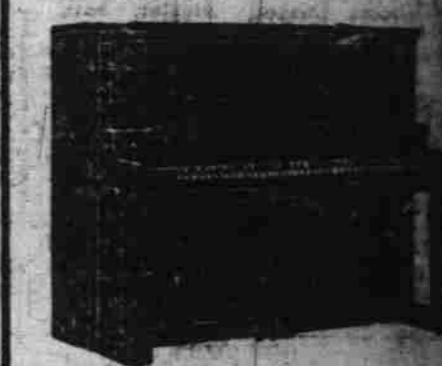

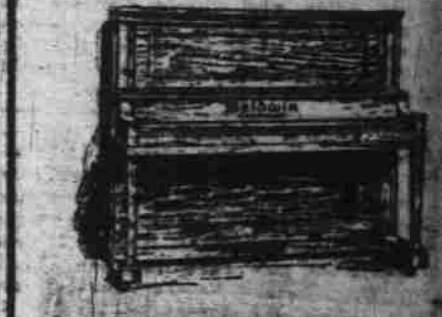
