## 750 BOWLERS IN 1923 MEET

Pacific Coast Bowling Congress to Attract Numerous Players

SAN JOSE, Calif., April 12.—The Pacific Coast Bowling congress, to be held here April 28-May 10, will break all previous Pacific Coast records for entries, according to an announcement made here by O. J. Forman, secretary and treasurer of the congress. San Jose, Secretary Forman announced, has entered its fiftieth team; San Francisco and Oakland have pledged fifty teams between them. Los Angeles, San Diego and the beach cities of southern California are counted on for another fifty, and Portland, Seattle and other northwest cities are sending teams to the tournament. The previous record of entries, together with the year and the city in which the congress was held, is as follows: San Francisco, 1915, 24 teams; San Jose, 1917, 29 teams; Los Angeles, 1918, 42 teams; San Francisco, 1919, 63 teams; Oakland, 1920, 84 teams; Fresno, 1921, 91 teams; Los Angeles, 1922, 123 teams. Los Angeles and San Francisco are out for the 1924 tournament. With 750 or more bowlers taking part in the team event, in addition to the special ladies' and Elks' events, the annual congress draws more than 1,000 people to the city which holds it, and keeps them there for three days to a week.

The Yankees did all of their scoring in the third inning, Babe Ruth getting off to a lusty start in his 1923 home run campaign by driving into the right field bleachers for the circuit, scoring Witt and Dugan ahead of him.

## BABE RUTH GETS FIRST HOME RUN

Yankee Slugger Comes Back Again and Sets 74,200 Ball Fans Wild

NEW YORK, April 18.—(By the Associated Press.)—Babe Ruth came back into his own today. When the mighty Yankee slugger cracked his first home run of the season far into the right field bleachers of the massive new Yankee stadium, 74,200 howling fans, the largest throng that ever attended a baseball game, rose to extend their idol a thunderous ovation. The first circuit clout clinching victory for the American league champions in their opening game with the Boston Red Sox, added the one touch needed to complete the most picturesque drama in diamond annals. The Babe, those thousands agreed, had come back.

A super-world's series atmosphere pervaded the formal dedication of the huge new home of the Yankees. The record crowd, which jammed every nook and corner of the huge triple-decked grandstand and packed all but a few corners of the bleacher sections, far exceeded expectations. Every seat in the mammoth structure could have been filled, but several thousand chose to stand in the aisles rather than perch

In the few vacant areas of the bleachers. The attendance bettered by more than 30,000 the previous high mark of 42,620 set at the Braves field, Boston, in 1916 in a world series game between the Red Sox and Brooklyn.
