The old St. Paul's church is being remodeled over into a social hall. When completed there will be kitchens, a small stage and a good floor. It will be known as St. Paul's Parish house.

**Small Shop to Open—**  
L. Springer and Dewey Probst will open a shoe shining parlor today in a small room between the Elgin hotel and the Western Union office. They have leased the room for three years.

**Hurt's Thumb—**  
Hugh Martin, an employe of the Oregon Pulp & Paper company, had his thumb crushed at the mill this week.

A daughter, Mary Jean, was born to Dr. and Mrs. G. E. Prime, yesterday morning.

**Estate Filed—**  
The final appraised valuation of the estate of C. A. Huston was filed in the county clerk's office yesterday and a date set for final hearing of account which will be May 21, at 10 a. m. According to appraisers the estate is valued at \$41,735. Heirs are Truma Huston, widow, who will receive one-fourth interest in the estate, and three daughters, Truth, Rose and Helen, who will receive a one-fourth interest each.

Robert Law of 224 Third street Portland, reported to police yesterday that as he was going north on the Highway three miles south of Salem he collided with H. E. Brown of 430 Sumner who was going south on the highway.

**Machinery Arrives—**  
About \$2000 worth of machinery has arrived and will be added to the drilling operation at St. Paul, according to County Commissioner Jim Smith who returned from that section yesterday.

A depth of about 1000 feet was attained in the search for oil when the company was forced to discontinue for lack of additional equipment. There are approximately 14,000 acres under exploitation for oil, according to Mr. Smith.

**Speeder Arrested—**  
G. J. Hogan was arrested by Officer Edwards yesterday on a charge of speeding at the rate of 33 miles an hour along South Commercial between Mission and Wilson. He was cited to appear before Judge Poulsen Monday.

**Cars Collide—**  
W. T. Mulkins of Gervais, while going west on the Silverton road near Salem yesterday, reported that another car going in the same direction collided with him, causing some damage.

**Permit Issued—**  
A building permit was issued to H. J. Ettner yesterday. He will erect a one-story dwelling costing \$1,750.

**Collision Yesterday—**  
Chester C. Horner of route 5, while going west on State yesterday reported that he was struck by a motorist who was going north on Liberty. The front axle on the Horner car was bent. Otherwise no damage was done.

**Autos Collide—**  
James E. Bridgewater of 219 Fourth street, Albany, while going south on Commercial yesterday collided with A. J. Krueger of route 2, who was turning at the intersection of South Commercial and Hoyt. Slight damage was done.

**Machines Investigated—**  
Slot machines recently installed by local cigar stores are the subject of inquiry by Ralph Thompson, chairman of the police committee of the city council. He asked John H. Carson, district attorney, for an opinion on the matter yesterday. The slot machine gives out two sticks of gum and sometimes a check which may be exchanged for merchandise—all for a nickel.

**Child's Arm Broken—**  
Raymond, 3 year old son of Mrs. L. S. Jordan of Valsest, suffered a broken arm yesterday when his mother, in going to look for him, accidentally stumbled and fell on him. The fracture was of the right arm at the elbow. He was rushed to Salem where he received medical attention.

**More Babies to Adopt—**  
Dr. Henry E. Morris has the names of two baby boys whom their parents desire to give out for adoption. One is 10 days old and the other six weeks old. A tiny baby girl found a new home last night through the good offices of Dr. Morris, who went over to Silverton and brought the baby back with him. Dr. Morris has built up quite a reputation during the last six months as an unofficial home finder for youngsters.

**Stolen Goods Returned—**  
Five of the shell-rimmed eye glass frames taken from the display case of the Morris Optical company several months ago were returned yesterday. The frames were of the latest model in shell. Having fitted up the family—the guilty party evidently decided that since the rest were useless they might as well be returned. The small case is lighted all night and opens into the lobby of the building.

**Will Cancel Franchise—**  
The Nehalem Boom company is given authority to cancel and surrender its logging and booming franchise by an order of the public service commission issued yesterday. The franchise was granted by the commission originally to allow the company to boom and raft logs on Willamette slough.

**Shortage Small—**  
The only car shortage reported by the Southern Pacific company to the public service commission yesterday was 49 flat cars. The company's report pertains only to the state of Oregon.

**Plans Submitted—**  
Preliminary plans for the addition to the Salem high school were filed yesterday at the city superintendent's office. These will be considered by the board at the next meeting. F. A. Legge is the architect. The new plans call for an addition to face Church street extending south 100 feet. Work will begin as soon as the plans are complete and bids submitted. It is expected to have it completed by the opening of school in October. The buildings now occupying the ground on which the addition will stand will be moved within a few weeks.

**State Taxes Paid—**  
Clatsop county has turned over in full its first half of state taxes for this year, amounting to \$104,221.18.

**Heavy Loss Reported—**  
The Spokane, Portland & Seattle Railroad company, in its annual report to the public service commission, reports a loss of \$1,576,164.32 on its net income. Operating revenues were \$7,382,885.31, operating expenses \$4,909,450.73, taxes \$894,409.72 and operating income \$1,829,685.21.

**Bodwell in Custody—**  
E. E. Bodwell, insane ex-soldier who has been causing much trouble to state and federal authorities is again under arrest at Albany, according to information received today by Dr. R. E. L. Steiner, superintendent of the state hospital for the insane. Bodwell was committed to the Salem institution from Linn county. He escaped and returned to Linn county where he was arrested, but the federal authorities refused to send for him. Arrangements were then made to recommit him to the Oregon hospital, but in the meantime he escaped again. It is presumed he will be again transferred to the custody of the government.

A total of 630 accidents were reported to the state industrial accident commission for the work ending April 19. Of this number six cases were fatal. The fatalities were: James Wood, West Salem, leverman on dredge; John G. Clinton, Myrtle Point, carpenter; H. H. Holderman, Valsest, trimmer spotter; Joseph Vangness, North Bend, logger; S. L. Gilbert, Forest Grove, laborer; Fred Butterfield, Marshfield, blacksmith. Of the total number of accidents reported 594 were subject to the provisions of the workmen's compensation act, 28 were from firms and corporations that have rejected the act and eight were from public utility corporations not subject to the act.
