**Money Made Available**—  
The sum of \$15,000 appropriated by the 1923 legislature for the Soldiers, Sailors and Marines' Cemetery association for the improvement of a five-acre plot in Mount Scott cemetery, Portland, became available yesterday when the state board of control approved a contract between this association and the Mount Scott Cemetery association. # SCHOOL PLANS ARE PROBLEM

## Architect Authorized to Draw Permanent Specifications For New Wing

The school board wrestled at great length with the high school addition last night. Then it authorized Architect Fred Legge to prepare permanent plans covering an addition running south 100 feet from the east end of the present building, along Church street. It will be close to 74 feet wide, and three stories high, to exactly match the present building in height and architecture.

It will not be quite on the line flush with the east line wall of the present structure, but will be set in a foot or more, to give a little architectural relief from too long a straight, unbroken wall. The new east entrance may be set out a few feet, to break up the monotony of a perfectly straight wall.

**Fourteen Class Rooms**  
The new structure is to have 14 class rooms, according to the plan submitted by Architect Legge. These will be changed very little, save to reduce some of the dimensions from the 82 foot width that had been proposed. The gymnasium will cover the entire upper floor, being about 71 by 97 feet in the clear; large enough for two basketball courts for practice, or for one big standard court and approximately 800 spectators. A narrow balcony will be considered, two rows of seats along either side which would care for 250 spectators. The roof will be trussed, like the armory roof, which is 90 feet in width.

**Gym Offers Problem**  
The board came near disagreeing on a gymnasium, and retaining the present inadequate but nevertheless usable floor, which is 61 by 66 feet in size. But finally the new plan was worked out to a measurable satisfaction to all, and it will be followed. The present gym can be cut up into class rooms, to make about six good rooms. This, with the new addition, will add 20 class rooms to the present high school equipment, besides the gym practically twice the present size and far better dressing and physical education quarters.

It's going to call for some fast work on the part of the contractors to get the new building finished in time for the fall term.

# CITY OF PORTLAND AGAIN FAVORED

## Supreme Court Denies Petition for Rehearing by Insolvent Bank

The supreme court yesterday in banc, denied a petition for rehearing by the insolvent State Bank of Portland in the case of the City of Portland against the bank. This is the case in which an opinion of the court about two weeks ago held that securities put up by the bank as collateral for a deposit of \$110,000 of city money in the bank should be sold, and the proceeds applied to payment of the city's deposit.

Other opinions handed down were: Earl H. Fehl et al, appellants, vs. the city of Medford; appeal from Jackson county; suit to enjoin delivery of deed to city for property sold to satisfy delinquent assessment. Opinion by Justice Harris. Judge J. W. Hamilton affirmed.

Christena Schoren vs. Mathias Schoren, appellant; appeal from Wasco county; appeal from decree annulling marriage status. Opinion by Justice Brown. Judge Fred W. Wilson reversed.

Alice Sandoz, appellant, vs. Harry Sandoz; appeal from Union county; suit for divorce. Opinion by Chief Justice McBride. Judge J. W. Knowles reversed.

W. Hosea Wood, appellant, vs. School District No. 13, et al; appeal from Multnomah county; suit to restrain issuing or disposing of school district bonds. Opinion by Justice Rand. Judge G. W. Stapleton affirmed.

R. C. Oeder vs. R. P. Watt, appellant; appeal from Marion county; suit for breach of contract. Opinion by Justice Burnett. Judge George G. Bingham reversed and case remanded.

## O. W. Brown Is Granted Divorce From His Wife

Although Mrs. Rilla J. Brown tried to get a divorce from her husband, O. W. Brown, in circuit court in May, 1920, and failed, her husband succeeded in getting one from her yesterday by a decree signed by Judge Kelly. Mrs. Brown in her complaint alleged scandalous conduct but the judge refused to believe it. Mr. Brown
