BORAH BEGINS HIS WORLD COURT ATTACK

the trend of sentiment. Question Held Moral One Supporting President Harding in his contention that the United States should participate in the permanent court of international justice, Elihu Root tonight told the American society of international law that the question presented by the president's message to the senate was really only a question of moral support.

"The amount of contribution toward the support of the court to be determined by our own congress would be negligible," asserted Mr. Root. "We undertake to do nothing and give nobody authority or power to do anything to us. The question is merely whether we shall give our moral approval to the establishment of the same kind of court which our government has been urging for a generation."

In addressing the society, of which he is president, at its seventeenth annual meeting, Mr. Root described at length the genesis and nature of the world court, his reasons for believing it superior to the old Hague tribunal, the clear distinction which he said had been made between the league of nations, the development of international law despite the world war and what he held to be the fallacy in reasons advanced why this country should not support the court.

"Then, in closing his address, he said: "I wish to express my warm agreement with what Senator Borah has recently said about outlawry of war. To that end I sincerely hope that the approval of the United States may be given to this international court which represents the highest point yet reached by agreement of the nations in affording the same substitute for war by judicial decision of international causes that has been so effective in doing away with private war among individuals."

IWW STRIKE IS NOT SERIOUS

Few Loggers Strike
PORTLAND, Ore., April 26.—Not more than 500 men in the logging camps of Oregon had answered the IWW strike call up to tonight, according to reports received here at headquarters of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen and at offices of several lumber companies. In Klamath county, where some 300 men struck yesterday no considerable accessions to the ranks of the strikers were made today. Some few men in a camp at Silverton struck. Coos, Tillamook and Lincoln counties again reported all camps and mills working full crews. Reports received at Klamath Falls from Weed, Cal., said no men had struck there.

Traffic Said Normal
NEW YORK, April 26.—Activities of the striking IWW marine transport workers delayed departure a short time today of coastwise steamship Henry R. Mallory, with 150 passengers for Key West and Galveston. Harbor conditions otherwise were reported normal.

Union officials said the strike had gained strength but steamship officials belittled their claims of traffic interruption.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 26. Reports from the lumbering sections of northern California and southern Oregon received here today indicated little or no spread of the strike of Industrial Workers of the World in the logging camps and lumber mills. Small strikes were in progress near the Klamath Falls, Ore., and in Plumas county, California.

STOCK QUOTATIONS REMAIN UNCERTAIN

NEW YORK, April 26.—Price movements in today's stock market, for all practical purposes, consistently followed their narrow and uncertain trend of recent days. Dealings were moderately larger but the trading was almost entirely in the hands of professionals. Holders of securities showed no inclination to become alarmed and efforts to push down prices were, for the most part ineffective. However, there was no noticeable effort to force prices up rapidly. Of chief interest was the first increase in call money rates this week, the rate rising gradually from 4 1/2 per cent in the first hour to six per cent shortly before the close. Speculators for the decline sought on each successive increase in the rate to force prices down by concentrating on a few shares but their efforts failed to shake the general list. Most of the usual market leaders fluctuated within fractional limits, reflecting the varying operations of the trading element. Several of the food and tobacco specialties scored substantial gains and public utilities were consistently strong.

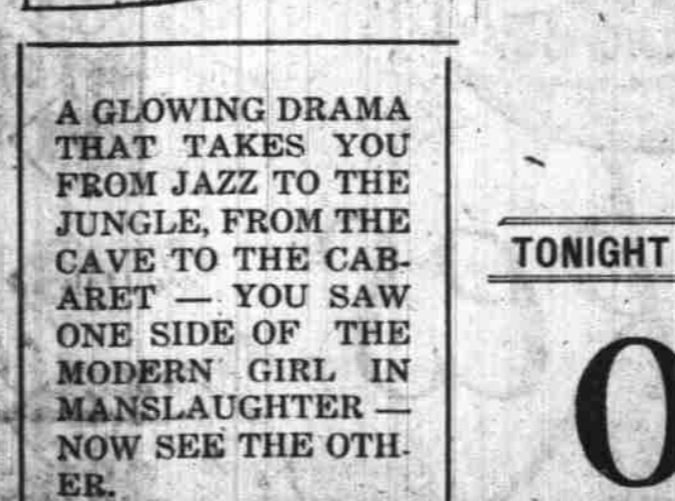
