RAQUET WIELDERS OF OREGON BEATEN BY BEARCAT TEAM

Willamette may have fallen a bit by the wayside in football and basketball, but the victory bell rang with a peculiar radiance and resonance Saturday over the latest news from the intercollegiate tennis courts.

It was the same old story as it has been for the past two years—Willamette practically everything, the enemy practically nothing at all. The opponent this time was the University of Oregon, said to be a locally important school located down at Eugene or somewhere to the southward. The record was: Willamette four games, Oregon one.

Huston of Willamette, who was also one of the football players who did not succeed in wiping the earth with Oregon or other opponents last fall, trimmed Williams of Oregon two straight sets, 6-1, 8-6. The visitor put all he had in the ball in the second set, and ran the score pretty well up, but the Bearcat finally took the victory.

Emmel, of the basketball squad that Oregon crowded over during the winter, took Culbertson of Oregon down the line for two straight sets, 6-4, 6-4. Mickey,

also a football man who lost last fall, played rings around Starkweather of Oregon, winning by a score of 6-3, 6-4.

Huston and Emmel won from Williams and Culbertson, in straight sets, 6-4, 6-4. The only upset of the day was in the last doubles match, when Huston and Mickey lost to Culbertson and Starkweather, 6-2, 6-2. This was a curious and inexplicable reversal of form, for all the Willamette players had punished their opponents in the singles, and had won safely.

Huston was third man on the championship team last year, though playing a less flashy game than Moodie and Doney. He has improved steadily, so that good judges say he would now be a good match for Doney and would even make the invincible Moodie extend himself.

The other two players are newer, but both are fast and capable, and the team as a whole may even duplicate the record of last year, when Willamette simply annihilated everything else in the northwest.

The games were played on the Salem Tennis association courts at the state hospital grounds.
