"Buy two bits worth of sugar at a time and bust the sugar trust." This was the advice given Salem housewives yesterday by Edward Schunke, member of the Both Grocery company.

"When sugar prices shot up from \$9 to \$25 a hundred in 1920 many folks decided they would just lay in a supply and as a result some of them are still using \$25 sugar," said Mr. Schunke.

"If the 8,000 families in the Salem trade district each bought a sack of sugar it would mean 20 carloads of sugar coming into Salem, while if each family buys 25 cents worth at a time and makes it last perhaps a week that means only a carload every 20 days.

Gopher Killing Subject Of Farm Demonstration

Macleay farmers, who have commenced their annual war against the gopher, one of their worst enemies, were treated to a scientific demonstration of gopher killing yesterday by A. W. Moore, of Phoenix, Arizona, biological assistant of the United States department of agriculture, who, accompanied by County Fruit Inspector Van Trump, addressed a group of some 17 farmers.

One ounce of strychnine is added to 10 pounds of clover leaves, the gophers favorite food, according to Mr. Van Trump, which is thoroughly mixed in a manila bag. The contents are then put in the path of the gophers main track.
