GIBBONS PUTS UP FORFEIT MONEY

Challenger to Train at Billings and Dempsey at Great Falls, Mont.

CHICAGO, May 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—With the posting of a \$75,000 forfeit, Eddie Kane, manager of Tom Gibbons, St. Paul heavyweight, today fulfilled the challenger's contract, binding a championship match with Jack Dempsey, at Shelby, Mont., on July 4.

Kane plans to leave for St. Paul tomorrow to complete details preliminary to Gibbons' departure for the training camp. He hopes to engage Billy Miske, the St. Paul heavyweight, as one of Gibbons' sparring partners.

Miske fought Dempsey twice; knows his style, and Kane figures he will be a valuable assistant.

Gibbons will leave on a barnstorming trip through the west, meeting all comers in all important towns in Utah, Montana and the Dakotas. He expects to be settled in training camp not later than May 17. It is possible that he may train in Billings, Mont., as he has received an invitation to establish camp there.

Dempsey will do his training at Great Falls.

Mike Collins, matchmaker for the Montana promoters, left tonight for Minneapolis, en route to Shelby, to superintend the construction of an arena seating 40,000 and costing \$50,000. Work will be started Wednesday morning, Collins said, and the contractors have assured him of its completion within a month.

Jess Willard, who is matched with Floyd Johnson in the main bout of 15 rounds, and Jack McAuliffe, opponent of Luis Angel Firpo in another 15-round contest, went through their paces at a Yonkers gym; Johnson performed before a crowd at his camp on the outskirts of Yonkers, while Firpo transferred his conditioning activities from Madison Square Garden to an open air ring on the roof of the building.

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SEVEN AMERICANS PASS FINAL ROUND

Dr. Willing and S. Davison Herron Do Not Get Started Until Today

DEAL, England, May 7.—(By the Associated Press.)—Seven Americans passed through the first round of the British amateur golf championship today. Five others who came across seas, hopeful of taking back with them the British title, went down to defeat. Two others of the team, S. Davison Herron and Dr. O. F. Willing, will not get started until tomorrow.

Numbered among the 72 ambitious amateurs who failed today were Jess Sweetzer, the American champion, and Robert A. Gardner, captain of the American team, on whom high hopes had rested. Neither man played well in the wind today—a wind that killed many fond dreams.

With them went down Guy Standifer of Washington, Reginald M. Lewis of Greenwich, Conn., and H. S. Lake of Hartford, Conn. Those of the Americans who won their matches are Francis Oulmet of Boston, now the lone member of America's "big three" remaining in the tournament; George V. Rotan, the Texas amateur champion, who breezed along recording pars or birdies with splendid regularity; Maxwell R. Marston of Philadelphia; Harris R. Johnston of St. Paul; Fred Wright, Jr., of Los Angeles; John F. Neville of San Francisco, and Robert Hunter also of Los Angeles.

and act for the best interests of the city of Salem.

"I know who you mean," Alderman Marcus shouted, as he arose to his feet. "You mean me. I want to tell you Mr. Mayor that Mr. Suter is all wrong; he's got a brainster."

"When people can't think of anything else to say," Alderman Suter retorted hotly, "they lie. You don't know what you are talking about. You voted against the ordinance because Suter introduced it and you thought it would hurt your business."

"I voted against it because," Alderman Marcus again began, but Mayor Glees intervened at this point and order was once more restored. "I will veto every traffic ordinance that comes up," Mayor Glees asserted, "unless this council can prepare and submit an ordinance which will embody every phase of the safety zone problem."

Report Rejected
The recommendation of the ordinance committee was then voted upon and it was decided by the council not to accept recommendations made. It looked for a time as though Alderman Suter had saved his ordinance, but when it came up for final reading at the close of the meeting it was defeated by the majority of one vote. It was at this point that Alderman Simeral introduced his measure providing for the temporary establishment of a safety zone at State and Commercial.

Alderman Hal Patbin opened the meeting by firing a broadside against the practice of granting too many street improvement petitions.

"It is time to cut them down," he asserted. "The city has already granted more improvements than it can pay off warrants." His remarks took full effect a short time later when the ordinance committee voted not to vacate John street. The action brought a storm of protest from a number of aldermen who alleged that the residents in this vicinity all favored the vacation of the street.
