NEW YORK, May 9.—As the 10 heavyweights entered in the elimination contests at Yankee stadium Saturday began tapering off in their training today, promoters made preparations to care for the greatest crowd that ever witnessed a pugilistic carnival. Predictions of promoters, based on the advance demand for seats, were that close to 100,000 persons would be in the baseball amphitheater. This would eclipse the crowd of more than 90,000 that saw George Carpentier bowled to the canvas at Boyle's Thirty Acres, Jersey City, July 2, 1921.
