VIRGIL EARL IS ELECTED

Former State University Star Is Made Director of Athletics

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, May 12. (Special to The Statesman.)—Virgil D. Earl, former University of Oregon football and baseball star and since his graduation in 1906 a leader in amateur athletics in the state, today accepted appointment as director of the department of athletics at his alma mater. He will begin his work on the Oregon campus in the fall.

Earl is principal of the Astoria high school. For 11 years he was football coach at Washington high school, Portland, developing three championship eleven and many other teams that tied for Portland interscholastic honors.

Appointment Approved
The executive council of the University Associated Students, authoritative manager of all student body functions, including athletics, approved Earl's appointment by unanimous vote. The post is newly created by the board of regents. An athletic director has been desired for two years to round out the work of the school of physical education, but the finances did not permit of the completion of the department until this spring. The post is an administrative one and is in addition to the coaching staff.

Dean John F. Bovard of the school of physical education recommended the appointment of Earl because of the latter's keen interest in and grasp of intercollegiate athletics, as well as intramural sports, and his executive talent. Earl's coming to Oregon is expected to give added impetus to all forms of sports, with successful intercollegiate teams the prominent feature of the athletic system.

Athletes Made Study
"I have always been intensely interested in athletics," said Earl in accepting the appointment.

"Not so much because of the pure sport of athletics, but because of the tremendous influence athletics have in the development of character in men. I am strongly in favor of the policy of the university in coordinating the work of the school of physical education has made an invaluable contribution to the athletic spirit of the university in my opinion."

"The appointment of an athletic director is another step in the university's plan to do all possible to build up a splendid type of athletics," said Dean Bovard. "To further athletic development we have undertaken not only to build up a good personnel within the school, but we have undertaken to increase the material facilities for this work. Recently, a 22-acre tract southeast of the campus was set aside for fields for the big athletic and recreational program. This will include new varsity baseball fields and stands, four intramural baseball fields, two football practice fields, one for hockey, one for soccer, four outdoor basketball courts, 16 handball courts, 18 tennis courts, as well as the completion of the 236 yard straightaway for track.

All Students Participate
"The school of physical education thoroughly believes in intercollegiate athletics. It sees athletics as the flower of a program, participation by the whole student body in games and sports. Already 770 individual men are engaged at Oregon in varsity and intra-mural sports and gymnasium activities. We have more men out for track this year than ever before."

Earl was not only a star guard and tackle and a good varsity ball player while an Oregon undergraduate, but he managed the track team one season. It was largely through his influence that "Bill" Hayward, track coach, came to Oregon. In 1902 Oregon held a dual meet with Albany college, coached by Hayward. Oregon was trimmed. Earl lost no time in inducing Hayward to accept an Oregon contract the following season.

"Earl should make an excellent athletic director," said Hayward. "He was a splendid athlete in college and later became a successful coach. He possesses administrative ability and understanding. He ought to do much for Oregon athletics."
Linn county, Or., was Earl's birthplace. He received his early education in the Dayton and The Dalles high schools. Prior to going to Washington high in 1908, he coached at Lewiston, Idaho high school in 1906 and at the Chemawa Indian school during the last part of the 1905 season.

While at Washington high Earl developed some of the leading athletic stars of the northwest, including Ed Leader, now Yale rowing coach, and Elmer Leader, former University of Washington football crew star; Johnny Beckert, regarded by many as one of the best football players of his time; Anson Cornell, Johnny Persons, Lloyd Tegart, "Tubby" Prezier, Stanley Anderson, Ed Strowbridge and late Arthur Knouff, who died in war service.

The 1912 Washington high team, coached by Earl, overwhelmed the Wendell Phillips high school, Chicago city champs, by a 39 to 0 score.

World's Record Broken By Man Who Made It
IOWA CITY, May 12.—Charles Brooks of the University of Iowa broke his own world's record of 22 4-10 seconds in the 220-yard low hurdles by two-fifths of a second in the Iowa Chicago western conference dual meet here this afternoon, according to the time recorded by four officials.
